

Austin, Texas, July 14 and 15, 1950 *
Meeting No. 507

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the Office of the President at 11:00 a.m., Friday, July 14, 1950, with the following present: Regents Woodward (Chairman), Warren (Vice-Chairman), Darden, Kirkpatrick, Rockwell, Swenson, Tobin, and Tucker; President Painter; Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons; Vice-President Dolley; Assistant to the President Granberry; Director of News and Information Service Keys; and Secretary Holt. Dr. Terrell was unable to attend the meeting because of illness.

MEDICAL BRANCH

BIDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW LABORATORY BUILDING.-- Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported that in accordance with previous instructions from the Board bids had been received, opened and tabulated in the presence of the Chairman of the Regents' Building Committee, the Consulting Architect, the Associate Architects, and representatives of bidders concerned, for the construction of the New Laboratory Building for the Medical Branch in Galveston. He pointed out that two letters which were apparently bids had been received after the deadline for opening and requested instructions concerning their disposition. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Tucker, the Board instructed the Vice-President and Comptroller to return the bids unopened.

Mr. Simmons then presented to the Board the bids received and a tabulation of the bids with the explanation that three of the bids had not been tabulated inasmuch as they were qualified or conditional bids and could not be considered by the Board as firm bids. On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the action of the Vice-President and Comptroller in omitting from the official tabulation of bids those of the following named companies because the same do not represent legal bids:

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR FINISH HARDWARE FOR SERVICE BUILDING.-- Mr. Tucker presented a recommendation of the Building Committee that the General Contractor on the Service Building be requested to enter into an appropriate contract with Gage and Finch, Inc. of Austin, Texas, for the Hardware Contract for the Service Building on their low bid of \$7,434.00 and moved that the recommendation be approved. On second by Mr. Swenson the Board approved the recommendation.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR HARDWARE FOR JOURNALISM BUILDING.-- Mr. Tucker presented a recommendation of the Building Committee that the General Contractor for the Journalism Building be requested to enter into an appropriate contract with Gage and Finch, Inc., Austin, Texas, for the Hardware Contract for the Journalism Building in the amount of their low bid of \$5,101.00, and moved that the recommendation be approved. On second by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR ELEVATORS FOR SERVICE BUILDING AND JOURNALISM BUILDING.-- Mr. Tucker presented a recommendation of the Regents Building Committee that the General Contractor on the Service Building and the Journalism Building be requested to enter into an appropriate contract with the Elevator Service Company of Fort Worth, for the Elevator Contracts for the two buildings in the amount of their low combination bid of \$44,391.00 and moved that the recommendation be approved. On second by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

Vice-President Leake, Vice-President Elliott, Dr. Clark, Dr. Ewalt, and Mr. Cappleman came into the meeting.

POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE SAN ANTONIO DIVISION OF THE POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.-- President Painter reported receipt of a letter from Dr. Charles S. Venable stating that all of the conditions stipulated by the President as prerequisites to the establishment of a San Antonio division of the Postgraduate School of Medicine have been complied with by the appropriate authorities in San Antonio. He pointed out that attached to Dr. Venable's letter were documents or letters in substantiation of this statement. He then presented a recommendation of the Medical Committee that the Board of Regents formally approve the establishment of the San Antonio Division of the Postgraduate School of Medicine of The University of Texas with the Robert B. Greene Memorial Hospital in participation at the present time. He further recommended for the Medical Committee the appointment of Dr. James A. Bethea as Assistant Dean of the San Antonio Division of the Postgraduate School

of Medicine, it being understood that this position does not carry tenure and that the funds needed for Dr. Bethea's salary and other expenses incidental to the operation of the San Antonio Division are to be supplied by the San Antonio Medical Foundation or other local sources. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the establishment of the San Antonio Division of the Postgraduate School of Medicine and the appointment of Dr. Bethea as Assistant Dean of that Institution effective July 15, 1950.

MEDICAL BRANCH

FLOOD DAMAGE AT MEDICAL BRANCH.--President Painter made the following report:

On June 3, 1950, a reported 14 inch deluge of water flooded the streets in Galveston, and water was forced over the curb and into the construction area on Eighth Street, between Mechanic and Strand, flooding the entire basement area of the new hospital and filling the basement pit against the walls of the Out-Patient Clinic, from which the excavation around the foundation had been removed by the contractor. The temporary bulkhead placed around the foundation wall by the contractor building the hospital collapsed under the water pressure, and the basement area occupied by the Drug Room and other storage space in the Out-Patient Clinic building was flooded by water to a depth of 6" 4". A careful and detailed inventory of the damage suffered by the Medical Branch has been prepared and shows a loss of \$41,039.50.

On June 27, Vice-President and Comptroller C. D. Simmons, after consultation with the University Attorney Judge Scott Gaines, wrote a letter to the J. W. Bateson Construction Company, of Dallas, Texas, general contractor for the erection of the new John Sealy Hospital, notifying them that as a direct result of their negligence in failing to protect properly and adequately adjacent property against encroachment and inundation of rain and flood waters, the University had suffered a loss from flood damage in the amount of \$41,039.50. Demand was made by Mr. Simmons of the general contractor that the above claim be paid by the general contractor, J. W. Bateson Construction Company. Receipt of Mr. Simmons' letter was acknowledged by the firm of J. W. Bateson Construction Company which stated that the letter, along with the itemized statement of damages, was being passed on to the Liberty Mutual Insurance Company of Dallas, Texas, for handling.

LETTER OF COMMENDATION TO MISS CHARLOTTE COLEMAN.--President Painter discussed with the Board the courageous acts and exposure to personal danger of Miss Charlotte Coleman, Director of the Drug Room, in her efforts to protect property of The University of Texas during the recent Galveston flood and recommended for the Medical Committee that a letter of commendation be written to Miss Coleman. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL

RENEWAL LEASE FOR SPACE FOR SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons be authorized to execute the renewal lease for building space for the Southwestern Medical School in Dallas subject to award by the State Board of Control. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mrs. Tobin, the Board approved the recommendation.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE FACULTY OF THE SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee the appointment to the faculty of the Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas, effective September 1, 1950, of the individuals set forth in the minutes of the Dean's Advisory Council, a list of which follows:

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION OF DEAN W. LEE HART.--Chairman Woodward brought to the attention of the Board the imminent retirement of Dean W. Lee Hart at Southwestern Medical School and discussed at length with the Board the outstanding service contributed by Dean Hart to the School. He then presented to the Board the following resolution of appreciation:

We, the faculty of the Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas, are most appreciative of the unselfish and untiring efforts that have been made in behalf of the Southwestern Medical College and the Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas by our Dean, Doctor W. Lee Hart. During his term of office much has been accomplished. With the institution of his leadership, the morale of the student body and faculty rose immediately. Departmental and instructional reforms were effected, and Southwestern Medical College became the Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas.

Doctor Hart has always had a sincere interest in every student, he has known them by name and has helped them with their many problems. For the members of the faculty, he has always had a listening ear and an open mind. He has willingly and sympathetically heard each one and has given sound counsel. He, as a man, has won the love, the admiration and the respect of the students and faculty. Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That we deeply regret the loss of such a valuable man, but we are happy and rejoice that he may now enter upon a mode of life that one who has given so much to his fellow men so rightly deserves.

2. That we shall always hold him in our highest esteem as a friend, teacher, scholar and counselor.

3. That, due to his outstanding leadership and achievements in the Medical School and the Medical community of Dallas, we, the faculty of the Southwestern

Medical School of The University of Texas, herewith recommend to the Regents and President of The University of Texas that Doctor W. Lee Hart be appointed as Dean Emeritus of the Southwestern Medical School of The University of Texas at Dallas, Texas, on or after September 1, 1950. This honor he rightfully deserves and merits.

On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board adopted the resolution as presented.

SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY

President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the Board ratify and approve a lease negotiated by Vice-President Elliott with Wharton Weems for the site of the Dental School temporary buildings. He explained that the lease has been signed by Chairman Woodward. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation and ratified the act of the Chairman in signing the lease.

AGREEMENT WITH JEFFERSON DAVIS HOSPITAL.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the Board approve an agreement between the Jefferson Davis Hospital and the Dental Branch of The University of Texas as negotiated by Vice-President Elliott and that the Chairman be authorized to sign the agreement. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

WAIVER OF NEPOTISM.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the nepotism rule be waived in the case of Dr. R. H. Cooper, former Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Texas Dental College and Professor of Crown and Bridge Prosthesis so that he might accept an appointment as Special Clinician in the Dental School. He then presented the following explanation:

At the present time, Dr. J. Allen Carpenter, the son-in-law of Dr. R. H. Cooper is a part-time Special Clinical Instructor. Earlier Dr. Carpenter and Dr. Cooper both served as members of the teaching staff in the Texas Dental College. The request to waive the nepotism rule in this case rests on the character of the employment as Special Clinical Instructors. Such positions carry no tenure and are on a relatively small part-time basis. Furthermore, Dr. Elliott is having great difficulty in recruiting well-trained individuals for his teaching staff.

On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the waiver of nepotism as recommended.

Anderson Hospital and requested an authorization to call for bids for the work and to approve the award of a contract on the bids when received, the contract to be signed by the President. On motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

The Board recessed for lunch at 12:30 p.m., and resumed its deliberations at 1:30 p.m.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS.-- President Elkins presented to the Board a list of Administrative Actions which he had taken at Texas Western College since the meeting of the Board on May 26 and 27, 1950, copies of which had been presented to the members of the Board under date of July 6, 1950. In Item 9 of the Administrative Actions, he corrected the word Diplomas to read Commencement. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the list as presented and corrected. (A copy of this list is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. Page 611)

DOCKET.-- President Elkins presented to the Board a list of recommended actions (Docket), copies of which had been furnished to members of the Board under date of July 6, 1950, and recommended their approval. On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the list as presented. (A copy of this list is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. Page 613)

PURCHASE OF FRACTIONAL BLOCK 20 OF ALEXANDER ADDITION.-- President Elkins recommended to the Board the approval of a proposed purchase of all of fractional Block 20 of the Alexander Addition to the City of El Paso and all of lots 1 to 20, both inclusive, Block 190 of the Alexander Addition to the City of El Paso for a consideration of \$800.00. On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

PURCHASE OF FRACTIONAL BLOCK 15 OF ALEXANDER ADDITION.-- President Elkins recommended that the Board approve the purchase of all of Fractional Block 15 of the Alexander Addition to the City of El Paso for a consideration of \$900.00. On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the purchase as recommended.

ESTABLISHMENT OF POSITION OF ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.-- President Elkins recommended that the Board approve the establishment of position of Associate Professor of Physical Education at Texas Western College at a salary rate of \$4,400 for nine months.

On motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

REMODELING OF OLD BURGESS HALL.--President Elkins reported that bids had been received as follows for the remodeling of Old Burgess Hall to convert it from its present use in the teaching of Biology to that of teaching Business Administration:

On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board accepted the low bid of Ponsford Brothers in the amount of \$28,600.00 and authorized the Chairman to sign the agreement.

REMODELLING OF CHEMISTRY BUILDING.--President Elkins discussed with the Board at length the problem of remodelling the Chemistry Building at Texas Western College and recommended that the Contractor now on the site, Mr. R. E. McKee, be hired from local funds to accomplish the remodelling work. On motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board authorized President Elkins to negotiate and execute the necessary change order or other pertinent form of agreement, the payment to be made from local funds.

APPROPRIATION FOR FOREIGN STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS.--President Elkins presented to the Board a request for the continuation of the Foreign Students Scholarships in the amount of \$2,000 for the 1950-51 Long Session. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board appropriated for Texas Western College \$2,000 to provide scholarships not to exceed \$125 per semester to worthy students. To be eligible for these awards, a foreign student must have demonstrated his ability to write and speak English satisfactorily; he must have a grade average of at least "C" on all course work taken at the school from which he transfers, or, if a former student of Texas Western College, he must have a grade average of at least "C" on the course work taken at this College during his last two semesters in residence; and he must be in need of this financial assistance in order to continue his education at the College. These awards are to be made by a scholarship committee to be designated by President Elkins.

PRELIMINARY PLANS FOR WOMEN'S PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING.--President Elkins recommended that the Board authorize preparation of preliminary plans for the Women's Physical Education Building by Mr. Percy McGhee at an estimated expenditure of \$95,000.00, total construction cost. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

PURCHASE OF PRINTING PRESS.--President Elkins recommended that the Board approve an expenditure not to exceed \$10,000.00 from the general fund for the purchase of a printing press, the purchase price to be reimbursed over a period of four or five years. On motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

CHILLED WATER LINES FOR PHARMACY BUILDING.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents approve a change order in the amount of \$7,601.00 to the contract with Joe Bland Construction Company to provide for enlarging a portion of an existing steam tunnel extending north from the Home Economics Building so as to accommodate chilled water lines necessary to connect the Pharmacy Building with the Central Water Chilling Plant.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation and authorized the Vice-President and Comptroller to sign the necessary documents.

EXCAVATION FOR AIR CONDITIONING CAFETERIA.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents approve a change order in the amount of \$5,100.00 to the contract with R. O. Davis, Inc., for an air conditioning system for the Cafeteria to cover the cost of doing certain excavation work necessary for the installation of some of the air conditioning machinery in the basement area. It had been expected that this part of the work could be done with the University's own Physical Plant crew, but this was found impractical.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation and authorized the Vice-President and Comptroller to sign the necessary documents.

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR UTILITY WORK FOR CLASSROOM BUILDINGS AND OTHER PROJECTS.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents authorize an amendment to a contract dated January 11, 1949, with Mr. Julian Montgomery, Engineer, so as to provide for his services in connection with the preparation of plans and specifications for utility work to serve the Classroom Buildings and certain other building projects either under way or under contemplation. The cost of the work is estimated to be between \$100,000.00 and \$200,000.00, and Regents' appropriation for the project has already been made.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL

APPROVAL OF PLANS FOR M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents approve working drawings, plans, and specifications for the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research Building as presented by MacKie and Kamrath under letter of transmittal and cost estimate dated July 11, 1950, and authorize the President to issue a call for bids, subject to final approval of the plans by Schmidt, Garden, and Erikson, Consulting Architects, and by the Texas State Department of Health. This approval is to include authorization for the payment of architects' fees due under the terms of the architects' contracts, which provide for a payment of 75% of the total fee when the contract is let or at the end of sixty days after final approval of the plans and specifications provided there should be a delay of sixty days or more between the acceptance of the plans and the taking of bids or the awarding of a contract.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY

PRELIMINARY PLANS FOR DENTAL BRANCH BUILDING.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents approve preliminary plans for the University of Texas Dental Branch Building in accordance with plans submitted by MacKie and Kamrath under letter of transmittal and cost estimate dated July 11, 1950, and that the Board

authorize the architects to proceed with the preparation of working drawings, plans, and specifications for a building of maximum size of 188,000 square feet or a maximum cost of \$4,304,000.00 including architects' fees, built-in equipment, and all exterior utilities and site work, provided that said plans shall include workable alternate proposals of sufficient scope that major reduction can be made in the cost of the building project should such reduction be found necessary. The Board's approval should include authorization for the immediate payment of architects' fees due under the architects' contracts with such payments to be made out of current legislative appropriations for the Dental Branch provided such payments are found to be in accordance with the terms of the Appropriations Bill.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS FOR CENTRAL WATER CHILLING AND DISTRIBUTING FACILITIES.--Mr. Tucker presented the following recommendation of the Building Committee:

That the Board of Regents approve plans and specifications for the construction of central water chilling and distributing facilities for air conditioning and the extension and modification of other mechanical systems on the Campus of the Main University at Austin as prepared by Zumwalt and Vinther, Mechanical Engineers, and authorize calling for bids to be opened at the September meeting of the Board of Regents.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mrs. Tobin, the Board approved the recommendation.

BOARD OF REGENTS

APPROVAL OF MINUTES.--Chairman Woodward presented to the Board for approval the minutes of the meeting of May 26 and 27, 1950, in the form in which they had been mimeographed and distributed by the Secretary, whereupon the Board approved the minutes as presented.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

ACCEPTANCE OF STUDENT HEALTH CENTER BUILDING.--President Painter presented the following report from Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

. . . Our contract further provides for final acceptance of the building in thirty days after the substantial completion of the building provided the building is then complete. If the Regents are not going to hold a meeting during the month of August, then it would be my suggestion that the Board authorize some committee . . . to act upon final acceptance of the building if and when the building should be fully complete.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mrs. Tobin, the Board authorized a committee consisting of President Painter, Vice-President Dolley and Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons to act in its behalf in giving final acceptance for the Student Health Center Building if and when the building should be fully complete.

ACCEPTANCE OF HILL HALL ADDITION.--President Painter presented the following report from Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

The work involved in the various contracts for Addition to Hill Hall is reported to be progressing on schedule. Unless

unforeseen delays should occur, the work will be ready for final acceptance and payment prior to the next meeting of the Board of Regents and hence it is recommended that the Board authorize some committee or official to give final acceptance when the work is completed and authorize final payment.

On motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board authorized a committee consisting of President Painter, Vice-President Dolley, and Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons to act in its behalf in giving final acceptance of the Addition to Hill Hall authorizing final payment.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL

USE OF GIFT FUNDS FOR CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT OF HOSPITAL FOR PAY PATIENTS.--President Painter discussed with the Board a letter from Mr. John H. Freeman, President of the M. D. Anderson Foundation, proposing that a certain portion of the gift money from the M. D. Anderson Foundation for the new cancer hospital be used for erecting and equipping a portion of the hospital to house pay patients. He then recommended for the Medical Committee that the Board accept in principle the proposal of the M. D. Anderson Foundation so that a letter of agreement setting forth the details could be worked out after appropriate discussions with the director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital, the Board of Regents and the University Attorney. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mrs. Tobin, the Board approved the recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

ADOPTION OF BY LAWS OF THE MEDICAL STAFF, STUDENT HEALTH CENTER.--President Painter recommended for the Medical Committee that the Board adopt the by laws of the Medical Staff of the Student Health Center as adapted to meet local needs from those set up by the American College of Surgeons and similar to those used by all approved hospitals. On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board adopted the by laws recommended. (A copy of the by laws is filed in the office of the Secretary)

The Board recessed at 5:30 p.m., until 9:45 a.m., Saturday, July 15, 1950.

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met for the remainder of their regular meeting in the Office of the President at 9:45 a.m., Saturday, July 15, 1950, with the following present: Regents Woodward (Chairman), Warren (Vice-Chairman), Darden, Kirkpatrick, Rockwell, Swenson, Tobin, and Tucker; President Painter; Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons; Vice-President Dolley; Assistant to the President Granberry; Director of News and Information Service Keys; and Secretary Holt. Dr. Terrell was unable to attend the meeting because of illness.

BOARD OF REGENTS

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS BY CHANCELLORSHIP COMMITTEE.--On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board authorized the Committee on Selection of a Chancellor consisting of Regents Tobin, Darden and Woodward to make out-of-state trips as required in the discharge of their duties.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

WAIVER OF NEPOTISM.--President Painter presented a recommendation of the Administrative Council that the nepotism be ruled in the case of Mr. W. A. Myers, Assistant Professor in the Department of Aeronautical Engineering and Mrs. Alice L. White, Secretary in the Defense Research Laboratory for the fiscal year 1950 to 1951. He explained that at the present time the release of Mrs. White from her work at the Defense Research Laboratory would cause a serious complication and that Mr. Myer had already been appointed as a member of the teaching staff for 1950-51. On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

DETAILED SALARY BUDGET FOR OFFICE OF GOVERNMENT SPONSORED RESEARCH.--President Painter discussed at length with the Board problems involved in the preparation of the Detailed Salary Budget for the Office of Government Sponsored Research. He then requested authority to approve finally the salary budget for all Government Sponsored Research Contract Projects for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1950, in accordance with the recommended budget as prepared by the Project Directors in the Office of Government Sponsored Research and as finally modified by himself. He further recommended that after such approval the Auditor be authorized to pay such salaries as set out by the Budget, the source of funds in each case to be the particular Government Contract and the Contract Item as shown on the list transmitted with the Budget. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Warren, the Board approved the recommendation.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIP FOR PROFESSOR C. E. AYRES.--On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board authorized an out-of-state trip for Professor C. E. Ayres from Cloudcroft, New Mexico, and return in connection with his work on the Committee to Submit Nominations for the Chancellorship.

REVISED LEASE FOR SPACE AT MIDLAND FOR UNIVERSITY LANDS, GEOLOGY.--President Painter presented the following recommendation of Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

In connection with the Air Conditioning Improvement Project for the Leggett Building in Midland, Texas, it has been necessary to cancel our Lease No. 2-34 for space in that Building as effective as of June 30, 1950, and make a new lease. The State Board of Control has now awarded a contract for a new lease with the Leggett Building, Inc., for the period July 1, 1950, through August 31, 1951, for office and laboratory space in the remodelled building at a rental rate of \$477.78 a month. I recommend that the Board of Regents ratify and confirm our action in cancelling the old lease and that they also approve the new lease and authorize me to sign it on the behalf of the Board.

On motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the recommendation and authorized the Vice-President and Comptroller to sign the lease.

REQUEST BY TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY FOR POWER SERVICE FROM McDONALD OBSERVATORY POWER LINE.--President Painter presented the following recommendation of Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

In order to obtain electricity for use at their relay station on Flat Top Mountain, the Texas Department of Public Safety has requested permission to connect onto the University's transmission line at the McDonald Observatory water well. I recommend that such permission be given and that as a matter of cooperation between two public agencies the permission be granted without payment of any sum which might otherwise be expected as a partial reimbursement for the University's cost of the installation of the transmission line. I further recommend that I be authorized to sign the necessary agreement with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation and authorized the Vice-President and Comptroller to sign the agreement.

GREAT ISSUES COURSE.--President Painter discussed with the Board at length the question of the Great Issues Course and after discussion, the Board requested the President to proceed as necessary in the matter.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE WITH PAY FOR MR. R. L. DUKE.--President Painter reported that Mr. R. L. Duke, of the Division of Extension has been admitted to the Workshop on Human Relations at Bethel, Maine, and that the Division of Extension has requested that he be allowed to attend the workshop without loss of salary as a representative of the Division of Extension, the College of Education and the Hogg Foundation. He pointed out that the dates of the workshop are June 24 through July 15, 1950, and explained that Mr. Duke will report to all three divisions on his return. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the leave of absence with pay as recommended.

STATUS OF COMMUNISTS OF THE CAMPUS.--The problem of communists on the Campus was discussed and it was decided that a general statement of policy would be formed by President Painter, Vice-President Dolley and the Attorney General.

The press came into the meeting.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

DOCKET.--President Painter presented to the Board a list of recommended actions (Docket), copies of which had been furnished members of the Board under date of July 1, 1950, and recommended their approval. On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the list as presented. (A copy of this is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. Page 663)

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS.--President Painter presented to the Board a list of Administrative Actions which he had taken since the last meeting of the Board on May 28 and 29, 1950, copies of which had been furnished members of the Board under date of July 1, 1950, and recommended its approval. On motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved this list as presented. (A copy of this list is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. Page 616)

AIR TRAVEL CONTRACT FOR HOGG FOUNDATION.--President Painter presented the following recommendation from Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

Dr. Robert L. Sutherland, Director of the Hogg Foundation, has, from time to time, discussed with this office the

desirability of having an air travel contract under which air transportation can be procured in connection with the work of the Hogg Foundation on the basis of credit cards issued for use of authorized personnel. As you may recall, the Attorney General, in Opinion No. 0-2868, dated November 4, 1940, has ruled that an air travel contract with the requirements, among other things, of a cash deposit of \$425.00 cannot legally be made when State Funds are involved. Mr. Scott Gaines, however, has advised me that, in his opinion, funds held by the Regents as Trustees of the Hogg Foundation can legally be used in connection with air transportation for the conduct of the work of the Hogg Foundation. In line with this advice, Dr. Sutherland has recommended that the Board of Regents authorize an air travel contract with Braniff Airways with an initial deposit of \$425.00 to be made from Hogg Foundation Funds at the beginning of our next fiscal year, September 1, 1950.

I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the contract and that the Vice-President and Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

On motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board of Regents approved the recommendation.

GIFT FROM THETA SIGMA PHI.--President Painter reported receipt of a gift from Theta Sigma Phi Sorority in the amount of \$200 to be used for scholarships for 1950-51 in the amount of \$100 each to the following.

For a sophomore girl who is majoring in Journalism who will be a Junior in the fall of 1950 - Miss Flo Cox

For a high school senior who will enter the University in the fall of 1950 with the intention of majoring in Journalism - Miss Peggy Lord.

On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board accepted the gift and request the President to express its sincere thanks to the donor.

EXTENSION TO GREENHOUSE.--President Painter reported that he had conferred at length with Dr. Gordon Whaley on the subject of the Grass Research Program and other matters. He then recommended that the Board approve construction of an extension to the Greenhouse to cost approximately \$20,000.00. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR PARKING DEVELOPMENT OF MEN'S DORMITORY GROUP.--President Painter presented the following report from Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons:

Confirming a report already given you in conference, I list below a tabulation of the bids received Monday, June 19, at 2:00 P. M., on the project "Parking Development, Men's Dormitory Group, The University of Texas, Austin, Texas."

In view of the fact that the lowest bid received was substantially above the amount originally estimated, the Supervising Architect was requested to negotiate with the low bidder for the elimination of portions of the work, looking to a reduction in the net contract award. As a result of these negotiations, the low bidder proposed reductions in the aggregate amount of \$7,412.40 for elimination of the specified items.

In accordance with approval given by you, a contract has been awarded to Collins Construction Company on the following basis:

The above award will necessitate an addition of \$4,923.60 to the appropriation previously set up for this project. This additional sum should be charged against General Funds, Unappropriated Balance.

The award should be reported to the Board of Regents for ratification and approval at the July meeting.

On recommendation of President Painter and motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved and ratified the action of the Vice-President and Comptroller in awarding the contract and authorized the appropriations indicated.

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS.--

EASEMENT NO. 449, STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has had under consideration a request from the State Highway Commission for a road right-of-way easement across various sections in Blocks 16 and 20, University Lands in Pecos County, Texas, containing approximately 62.474 acres. The State Highway Commission also requests five drainage channels in Blocks 16 and 20, Pecos County, covering a total of approximately 9.183 acres.

The Committee recommends that an easement covering the right-of-way and the drainage channels be granted for a nominal consideration of \$1.00 and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign an appropriate instrument which has been prepared by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the report.

EASEMENT NO. 450, U. S. GOVERNMENT.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

The United States Government by appropriate notice has terminated Easement No. 29 (U. S. Contract C4ca-493) covering 108 acres of land in Hudspeth County, Texas, leased for an emergency landing field and beacon site for El Paso-Fort Worth Airway, effective June 30, 1950. The Civil

Aeronautics Administration, however, wishes to continue the operation of the airways beacon and has made application for a new lease on a tract 100 feet by 100 feet in Section 27, Block D, University Lands in Hudspeth County, beginning July 1, 1950, and renewable at the option of the government from year to year, not to extend, however beyond June 30, 1960. The proposed consideration is a nominal figure of \$1.00.

The Land Committee recommends that the Board of Regents grant the lease and authorize the Chairman to sign the lease agreement in the form which accompanies this report.

EASEMENT NO. 451, PHILLIPS PETROLEUM COMPANY.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has had under consideration an application from Phillips Petroleum Company for renewal of Gasoline Plant Site Easement No. 139 which expired June 30, 1950. The easement covers 51.6 acres out of Section 1, Block 35, University Lands in Ector County, Texas, is for a ten-year period beginning July 1, 1950, and carries a rental rate of \$5.00 an acre a year payable annually in advance. The consideration covering the first year's rental has been submitted with the application.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Regents approve the renewal easement and authorize the Chairman of the Board to execute the agreement which has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the report.

CALICHE PERMIT NO. 46, McVEAN AND ROBERTS.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

The Land Committee recommends that the Board of Regents authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign a permit to McVean and Roberts for the removal of 6,637 cubic yards of dirt for road building purposes from University Lands in Upton and Reagan Counties, Texas, at a price of \$0.25 per cubic yard. The total consideration of \$1,659.25 has been tendered by the applicant.

RELEASE OF EASEMENT NO. 1, REAGAN COUNTY PURCHASING COMPANY.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

University Right-of-Way Easement No. 1 to Reagan County Purchasing Company, dated March 16, 1926, provided for termination in the event the land covered by the lease was no longer used for the purpose for which the easement was granted. The Reagan County Purchasing Company has now ceased to do business, and the Company has been dissolved and notice given of the termination of the easement, effective March 15, 1950. The Land Committee recommends that the Board of Regents authorize its Chairman to sign an instrument evidencing release of University Easement No. 1. The instrument has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the report.

EXERCISE OF OPTION OF WATER LEASE NO. 41, THE ATLANTIC REFINING COMPANY.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported for the information of the Board and for official entry in the Minutes the exercise of the option taken on Water Lease No. 41, by the Atlantic Refining Company in accordance with authorization given by the Board of Regents

and that Chairman Woodward had signed the lease and distribution had been made. The report reads as follows:

By the terms of Water Lease Contract No. 41, dated July 22, 1949, The Atlantic Refining Company was granted a permit to explore and an option to take a water lease on certain designated acreage in Crane County, Texas.

I wish to report that the Company, by appropriate notice duly given, has exercised its option effective, July 15, 1950, to take a water lease contract on Section 6, the West One-half of Section 15, the West One-half of Section 26, and the North One-half of Section 27, all in Block 31 University Lands in Crane County, Texas. The terms of the lease are as set forth in the option agreement. An appropriate lease agreement has been signed on the part of the University by Chairman Woodward and executed copies delivered to the appropriate parties.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MATTERS.--

WAIVER OF STATE OF TEXAS VETERANS' LANDS BONDS FOR PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

On July 25, 1950, the Veterans' Land Board will sell \$10,000,000.00 par value State of Texas Veterans' Land Bonds Series 1950-A (General Obligations), due serially each year June 1, 1956-85. These bonds represent the final installment of an authorized issue of \$25,000,000.00 being sold pursuant to Article II, Section 49-b of the Constitution of Texas, and by Senate Bill 29, passed by the Regular Session of the Fifty-first Legislature. The first installment of the bonds in the amount of \$5,000,000.00 was sold October 26, 1949, at a net interest cost of 1.6688%; and the second installment in the amount of \$10,000,000.00 was sold March 21, 1950, at a net interest cost of 1.7182%.

Under the provisions of the Constitution and laws, a preferential right of purchase is given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent Free School Fund, and the Permanent University Fund.

It is recommended that the preferential right of purchase be waived by the Permanent University Fund.

Upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the report.

PURCHASES FOR PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

Upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the report.

LEASE TO ALLRIGHT, INC., HOUSTON.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson:

The Finance Committee has had under consideration a proposal from Allright, Inc., and D. M. Carothers, to take a renewal lease on the property at 1108 Rusk Avenue in the City of Houston, held for the Hogg Foundation. The renewal lease is for a period of ten years beginning July 1, 1950, and provides for a monthly rental at the rate of \$1,150.00 per month. The terms of the lease, otherwise than as to rental payments, are to be substantially as in the present lease which includes, among other things, the right to the University to cancel the lease on thirty days' notice in the event of sale of the property or of a lease of the property on a long-term basis with permanent buildings or improvements to be placed thereon.

The Committee recommends that the Board accept the offer and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign the lease agreement subject to approval as to substance by the University Vice-President and Comptroller and as to form by the University Land Attorney.

EXTENSION OF NOTE TO GAVIN D. JAYNES --Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson

The Finance Committee recommends that the Board of Regents authorize an extension of the note of Gavin D. Jaynes, held for the W. J. McDonald Observatory Fund, so as to provide for an extension to December 1, 1950, of all past-due installments of principal and interest on his note given in connection with the purchase by him of a tract of 112 acres of land in Red River County, Texas. The Committee further recommends that the Vice-President and Comptroller of the University be authorized to sign the necessary extension agreement, subject to approval thereof as to form by the University Land Attorney.

SALE OF PROPERTY TO CITY OF HOUSTON. --Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Kirkpatrick, seconded by Mr. Swenson

The Finance Committee has given extended consideration to application from the City of Houston to purchase all of the property owned by the Board of Regents as Trustees of the Hogg Foundation: W. C. Hogg Fund in Blocks 37 and 53, Hardcastle Hopson Addition in the City of Houston. The land is needed by the Texas Highway Commission and the City of Houston in connection with a large traffic interchange at the intersection of Buffalo Drive and the Freeway project.

The Committee feels that the property is worth more than the price offered by the City and recommends that the Board of Regents authorize a counter proposal to sell the land to the City of Houston for a price of \$175,000.00. The Committee further recommends that the Chairman of the Board of Regents be authorized to sign an appropriate sales agreement in the event the offer is accepted by the City and to execute and deliver a deed to the property upon payment of the purchase price.

PROBATE OF WILL OF MRS. ALMA JACOBS HOUSE PINER. --Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported that the last will and testament of Mrs. Alma Jacobs House Piner under which The University of Texas is a beneficiary has been admitted to probate and that the First National Bank of Fort Worth, has been named as executor. He explained that notice of appeal by relatives has been given and that the case will come to trial in the District Court not earlier than October, 1950. He reminded the Board that it has previously engaged Mr. Thomas H. Law of the law firm of Tilley, Hyder and Law, and that the Attorney General has indicated that his Department will cooperate with the Board in an effort to uphold the will. He then estimated the probable value of the estate although still uncertain at between \$25,000 and \$30,000. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the action taken to date and requested the Vice-President and Comptroller to proceed in the matter.

ESTATE OF WILLIAM HEUERMANN, DECEASED. --Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons brought to the Board's attention a letter he had received from Guaranty Title & Trust Company, Corpus Christi, Texas, Executor under the will of William Heuermann, Deceased. This report showed that a partition of the community property had been worked out as provided for in the will and the property selected by Mrs. Heuermann turned over to her. Cash bequests under the will were in the process of being paid, with the residue of the estate, which under the will is to be liquidated by the Executor and the proceeds paid over to the Board of Regents "for cancer research purposes by the M. D. Anderson

Hospital for Cancer Research at Houston, Texas" having an appraised value approximately as follows:

The Executor's letter further pointed out that the nature of certain of the properties to be liquidated and the economic conditions in the area are such as raise a question as to the possibility of operating the properties for a time until a more opportune time for liquidation might arrive. Specifically, it was stated that the principal item of real estate was a stock farm, specially equipped for stock feeding. Continued operation of this farm would probably require the purchase of additional livestock for the most advantageous operation. Another substantial asset was a one-half interest in a partnership which owns and operates a hardware and implement store in the village of Edroy in San Patricio County, the forced liquidation of which was expected to result in substantial loss. The Executor's letter concluded by inviting the Regents to send a representative of the Board to inspect the properties and to express their views concerning the problems presented.

Mr. Simmons further reported that the letter had been considered by the Regent's Finance Committee, that the Committee was of the opinion that the suggested operation of a stock-feeding enterprise was unduly hazardous and should not be undertaken if it could be avoided. As to the hardware business, the Committee felt a sale of the business to the surviving partners, even if largely on credit, was preferable to the other alternatives confronting the Executor. Finally, the Committee had recommended that the Vice-President and Comptroller arrange to visit Corpus Christi in the near future to confer with the Executor and inspect the properties of the estate. On motion of Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board approved the Committee's recommendations.

BAND PROGRAM FOR 1950-51.--President Painter reported that a special committee appointed to recommend a band program for 1950-51 composed of D. X. Bible, C. D. Crowder, R. B. Fitzgerald, C. R. Granberry, J. H. Cavanaugh, E. P. Schoch, and Arno Nowotny, and recommended the following budget for Longhorn Bands for 1950-51:

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the Budget as recommended.

REVISION OF UP-OR-OUT RULE.--President Painter discussed with the Board at length the need for revision of the present Up-Or-Out Rule and presented for the Board's consideration the General Faculty recommendation for revision. He then recommended that the rule be

revised as follows:

(b) Unless otherwise stipulated in advance in the letter of appointment, the term of appointment of an instructor will be one year. In the event of decision not to reappoint an instructor for a second year, at least three months' notice will be given him. Thereafter one year's notice will be given him. After four years of full-time teaching at this University as an instructor, he will either be recommended for promotion to assistant professor or will be informed of the decision not to promote as provided in Chapter IV, Section 6. If promotion is not recommended, he will be continued as an instructor for a one year terminal period. Unless otherwise stipulated in advance in the letter of appointment, the term of appointment of an assistant professor will be two years. In the event of decision not to reappoint an assistant professor, one year's notice will be given him. After four years* of full-time teaching at this University as an assistant professor, the teacher will either be recommended for promotion to associate professor or will be informed of the decision not to promote, as provided in Chapter IV, Section 6. If an assistant professor has demonstrated ability, but because of extenuating circumstances the Budget Council believes he should be given more time, his appointment as assistant professor may be extended to six years, if agreeable to the individual. If promotion is not recommended, he will be continued as an assistant professor for a one year terminal period. If recommended for promotion, he will be given continuing employment.

*Provided, however, that in the case of all persons whose initial service as assistant professor began prior to September 16, 1952, this period will be six years rather than four years.

Mr. Kirkpatrick then moved that the recommended changes be adopted and Mr. Rockwell seconded the motion. The Chairman then ordered that since a change in rules was involved the matter be voted on at the September meeting.

Mr. Lemmon came into the meeting.

REFINISHING OF WRENN LIBRARY.--President Painter discussed with the Board at length the problems involved in refinishing the interior of the Wren Library. On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the refinishing of the Wren Library including necessary woodwork, repair of floors, changing of glass in windows, and removal of a wall plaque. The Board then, on motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, delegated the selection of interior color scheme to Mr. Tobin and a technical advisor of her choice, to be properly compensated.

COOPERATIVE DORMITORY FOR WOMEN.--Mr. Tucker presented the following request on behalf of the Building Committee:

Your Building Committee requests that preliminary studies in design and cost be made by the Consulting Architect and the Faculty Building Committee of a Cooperative Dormitory for Women. The cost per student house should not exceed \$3,000.00 and should be less if possible. The location should be in the girls' dormitory area along Whitis Avenue and the dormitory should accommodate approximately 150 girls. A report of these studies at the September meeting is requested.

On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board ordered that the study be made.

SITE OF NEW LAW BUILDING.--The Board discussed at length the problem of location of the New Law Building. On motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, it then reaffirmed its previous decision as to location of the New Law Building on the southeast corner of the Main Campus.

UNPAID SUBSCRIPTIONS TO TEXAS MEDICAL CENTER.--Mr. Rockwell and Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons reported at length on the status of unpaid subscriptions in support of University of Texas installation in the Texas Medical Center. Upon motion by Mr. Tucker, seconded by Mr. Kirkpatrick, the Board directed that the Second National Bank, fiscal agent, The University of Texas, Texas Medical Center Subscriptions, be requested to make further attempts at collection through letters to be drafted by officers of the Second National Bank in consultation with Mr. Simmons.

DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY TO AFFIX SIGNATURES OF CHAIRMAN AND SECRETARY OF BOARD AFTER ADMINISTRATIVE REORGANIZATION.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons pointed out that effective September 1, 1950, the Administrative Reorganization would require the delegation of authority to execute State Funds disbursement vouchers on behalf of the Chairman and the Secretary of the Board to officials and representatives at each component institution of the University. On motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board then authorized Chairman Woodward and Secretary Holt to delegate powers to the chief executive officers and the branch business officers respectively, at each component institution of The University of Texas to execute vouchers in their behalf.

AUTHORITY TO APPROVE TRAVEL EXPENSE ACCOUNTS.--Vice-President and Comptroller Simmons pointed out to the Board that the Appropriations Bill provides that travel expense accounts must be approved by the President or Chief Financial Officer and by the Auditor of any institution concerned. He stated that under the new Administrative Organization it would be desirable to have such approvals made at the various component institutions of the University provided that the State Comptroller approved. On motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board requested the Vice-President and Comptroller to seek approval of such procedure from the State Comptroller and authorized the approval of travel expense accounts at the component institutions concerned if the approval of the State Auditor can be secured.

The Board adjourned at 1:30 p.m. until Friday, September 29, 1950.

EXPLANATION AND REASONS:

The proposed curriculum in petroleum engineering differs from the existing curriculum in the following respects:

- (1) Geology 316, 322, 332 and 347 as required previously are to be dropped from the curriculum, and Geology 616a, 616b, 328 substituted therefor in the new curriculum.
- (2) C. E. 316 as required previously will be dropped from the curriculum and C. E. _____ a two-hour course will be substituted therefor in the new curriculum.

The above changes in this curriculum will permit the student to enroll in the same geology courses offered to students in geology, and thereby encourage engineering students to continue with a strong program in this minor if they so elect.

The remaining changes will permit a somewhat greater degree of freedom in the choice of electives.

These changes should result in a greater emphasis of fundamental studies and at the same time permit a greater degree of flexibility in a profession that crosses several fields of endeavor.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE DEAN OF STUDENT LIFE

The Dean of Student Life recommends the adoption of the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Students' Association.

1. Article V, Section 2, at present reads as follows:
"Elected editors of these publications shall be considered officers of the Students' Association, and candidates for those editorial positions must satisfy the following requirements:

A candidate for the office of Editor or Associate Editor of The Daily Texan, the Texas Ranger, or the Cactus must be a student registered in The University of Texas who has completed at least 75 hours of college work with a minimum average of "C" in his scholastic work. At least 45 semester hours must have been completed at The University of Texas. He must also satisfy the professional editorial requirements as prescribed by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Board of Directors of The Texas Student Publications, Inc."

The amendment proposes that this Section be rewritten to read as follows:
"Elected editors of these publications shall be considered officers of the Students' Association, and candidates for those editorial positions must satisfy the following requirements:

A candidate for the office of Editor or Associate Editor of The Daily Texan, the Texas Ranger, or the Cactus must be a student registered in The University of Texas who has completed at least 75 hours of college work with a minimum average of "C" in his scholastic work. A candidate for Editor or Associate Editor of the Texan must have completed at least 45 semester hours at The University of Texas. A candidate for Editor or Associate Editor of the Ranger or the Cactus must have completed at least 30 semester hours at The University of Texas. All candidates must also satisfy the professional editorial requirements as prescribed by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Board of Directors of the Texas Student Publications, Inc."

Reason and Explanation: The Board of Student Publications feels that the completion of 45 semester hours at The University of Texas is not necessary for the editors of the Ranger or the Cactus and that 30 semester hours is a sufficiently high standard at The University of Texas, since such candidates would still have to have completed 75 hours of college work.

2. Article II, Section 8, at present reads as follows:
"The Student Assembly shall have the following powers:
 - a. To elect from its membership each year one student member of the Board of Directors of Texas Student Publications, Inc., to serve for a term of two years, and in case a vacancy occurs to elect a successor for the unexpired term. Said member shall serve the full term of two years, even though his membership on the Assembly has expired, providing he continues to maintain the eligibility requirements for members of the Student Assembly.

- b. To appropriate all monies of the Students' Association, provided that no appropriation shall be greater than the amount of money in hand.
- c. To submit to the Students' Association, by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Assembly, any proposed amendment to this constitution.
- d. To create any appointive offices which it deems necessary.
- e. To bring articles of impeachment against any officer of the Students' Association by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Assembly. Trial of the accused shall be before the Student Court.
- f. To approve all appointments of the President of the Students' Association by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present, except the appointments to the Assembly itself, which may be disapproved only by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present at the first meeting after such Assembly appointment is made.
- g. To enact such rules and regulations for the conduct of elections as it deems necessary, except that no election law may be enacted within twenty days prior to a general election.
- h. To enact all laws necessary and proper for the general welfare of the student body."

The students voted to add the following paragraph:

- "i. The Student Assembly shall have the power to order the Chairman of the Election Commission to conduct a poll by ballot of all members of the Students' Association, or any reasonable class thereof, to ascertain the opinion of the student body on any issue which in the opinion of the Dean of Student Life is relative to the conduct of any function properly within the realm of the powers and interests of the Students' Association. Such polls may be ordered by two-thirds of the voting members present of the Student Assembly. Funds for the conduct of such polls shall be appropriated by the Student Assembly."

Reason and Explanation: The Students' Assembly wishes to have the power to conduct student opinion polls by balloting all members of the Students' Association to ascertain the opinion of the student body on any issue which is relative to student powers and student interests. At present such opinions may be taken by student opinion surveys, but the Assembly feels that they should have the power to conduct a poll by ballot in order to get a more complete sample of student opinion.

3. Article IX, Section 8, now reads as follows:

"The rights of statutory initiative and referendum may be exercised by the student body upon petition of a number of students equal to fifteen per cent of the total number of ballots cast in the last General Election.

Such petitions shall be presented to the Secretary of the Students' Association and the Attorney General shall determine the validity of such petition. If a petition be held valid the Student Assembly shall order the election to be held."

The amendment voted by the student body adds the following paragraph:

"The provisions of this section shall be construed as authorizing the use of the initiative and referendum to require a poll by ballot of all members of the Students' Association, or any reasonable class thereof, to ascertain the opinion of the student body on any issue which in the opinion of the Dean of Student Life is relative to the conduct of any function properly within the realm of the powers and interests of the Students' Association, provided that all ballots used in such polls shall afford the opportunity for all students polled to express an answer of yes, no, or no opinion on issue or issues. The results of these opinion polls shall never be kept secret and shall be published in The Daily Texan within five days."

Reason and Explanation: The Student Constitution provides for the exercise of statutory initiative and referendum by a petition from the student body. The students want to use this initiative and referendum to permit a poll by ballot of all members of the Students' Association to ascertain the opinion of the students on any issue which is within the realm of the powers and interests of the Students' Association.

4. Article VI, Section 10, paragraph 4, now reads as follows:

"A secret ballot shall be used for all elections and all ballots shall be of uniform size bearing only the names of the offices to be filled and the candidates for those offices, with no mark, number, impression, or perforation appearing anywhere on the ballot. When referenda are to be voted upon, simple statements of the propositions shall be printed on the ballots and spaces provided for affirmative and negative votes thereon."

The amendment voted by the student body proposes to amend this fourth paragraph to read as follows:

"A secret ballot shall be used for all elections and all ballots shall be of uniform size bearing only the names of the offices to be filled and the candidates for those offices, with no mark, number, impression, or perforation appearing anywhere on the ballot. When referenda are to be voted upon, simple statements of the propositions shall be printed on the ballots and spaces provided for affirmative and negative votes thereon, except as may otherwise be provided for within the provisions of this Constitution."

Reason and Explanation: This amendment is necessary in order to carry out the amendment to Article IX, Section 8.

RECOMMENDATION OF THE FACULTY COUNCILINTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

The Standing Committee on Admissions recommends certain changes in the University's admission requirements. In order that the Faculty may see the changes in the general framework of the admissions picture, the section of the General Information Bulletin (No. 4907; pages 9-16) wherein the changes occur has been copied as revised by the recommended changes. Some of the changes are major, some are minor, and some are largely changes in phraseology.

In order that the changes may be easily identified, minor changes and changes in wording are underlined once; major changes are in CAPITAL LETTERS.

The significant changes are:

1. To permit 1 unit in either Agriculture or Home Economics to count in the Natural Science Group.
2. To increase the number of free elective units from 4 to 5; and to reduce the required academic units from 11 to 10.
3. At present under the Special Quality Provision, a student who comes from the highest quarter of his high school graduating class and who ranks in the highest quarter of the group taking the Aptitude Test and the English Test given to all freshmen may enter without any high school deficiency. It is recommended that this concession be given to all who come from the highest quarter of their high school graduating classes and who also rank in the upper half of the group taking the freshman tests.
4. Admission to the College of Engineering by Individual Approval will no longer be available until the student has proved himself in another division.
5. The method for clearing entrance deficiencies on the part of Individual Approval students and others is liberalized.
6. The grade average requirement for out-of-state college transfers is lowered from C plus to C.

REASONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Changes 1 and 2 are recommended because it is thought that such revisions will improve public relations with the high schools and with the public. Furthermore, these changes are in line with the practices at other leading state universities, and also with the thinking of the Texas High School Principals' Association. Such changes will also facilitate the admission of good quality high school students who have not been eligible for admission previously. This is so especially in the cases of those coming from small high schools with limited offerings.

Change 3 is in accordance with a suggestion from the Director of the University's Testing and Guidance Bureau. His suggestion results from the experience his Bureau has had in administering freshman tests over a period of years. It is his feeling that no mediocre student will be admitted as a result of this change.

Change 4 is thought desirable since Engineering is a rigorous program and it seems unwise to permit a non-high school graduate to enter that college until he has had an opportunity to demonstrate his ability in a less rigorous program.

Change 5 is recommended to improve public relations with the group who enter with admission deficiencies especially Individual Approval students. This group has felt that an unduly difficult task has been imposed in making up high school shortages. Greater importance is now attached to doing good work in the University, and greater recognition is given for such performance.

Change 6 seems in order since we no longer have an overcrowded condition. It is probably still desirable to have a quality differential in admission requirements for in-state and out-of-state students. The non-resident fee does not cover the annual cost per student.

GENERAL INFORMATION

I. ADMISSION

Control over admission.--admission to all branches of the University is under the control of the Registrar. A formal application blank must be submitted by each applicant. Blanks may be obtained from the Registrar's Office.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Sex.--Applicants of both sexes are admitted to all colleges and schools of the University on equal terms.

Age.--An applicant must be at least 16 years of age. For the School of Law he must be 19; for the School of Medicine or the School of Nursing, 18.

Character.--An applicant must furnish satisfactory evidence of good moral character.

Vaccination.--An applicant must present a certificate showing that he has had smallpox or has been successfully vaccinated. See 1 under "Services," page 66.

Hazing pledge.--The Legislature having forbidden hazing and rushing in state educational institutions under penalty of fine and imprisonment, each applicant is required to sign the following pledge:

"I hereby pledge myself on my honor not to encourage or participate in hazing during my attendance at the University."

SCHOLARSHIP REQUIREMENTS

COLLEGES OF ARTS AND SCIENCES, BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION,¹ EDUCATION, FINE ARTS, AND PHARMACY²

(See Engineering Requirements on page ____)

Units.--Entrance requirements are stated in terms of units. A unit represents nine months of study in a subject in a secondary school, constituting approximately a quarter of a full year's work. A four-year secondary school curriculum should be regarded as representing not more than sixteen units of work.

Auditions for music students.--In addition to meeting the academic requirements, candidates for admission to the Department of Music must have an audition. Auditions are given on the two days immediately preceding the registration days in June, July, September, and February. A personal interview, in advance, is recommended.

Required subjects and units.--For admission at least fifteen acceptable units as specified below, with high school graduation (see "Methods of Obtaining Admission Units," page ____) are required. For this purpose an acceptable unit is any unit (but not a fragment) that is accredited by the State Department of Education and counted toward graduation by the applicant's high school except those in drill subjects, such as penmanship, physical education, military training, etc., and in extracurricular subjects. A single unit in a foreign language may be counted under Group G. The fifteen units offered for admission must include the following:

Nonresidents.--Applicants not legal residents of Texas must rank in the upper half of their graduating classes and must also comply with the subject requirements in the preceding section.

Special quality provisions.--Quality, however, is more important than full conformity to subject pattern. A course thoroughly mastered is worth more than one completed with low or even medium grades. Therefore--

(1) Any applicant who has fifteen acceptable units and who ranked in the upper half of his high school graduating class may enter with a deficiency in any group except English, and any such deficient first-year freshman student who makes, in the University, in his first Long Session or its equivalent, at least thirty semester hours with an average grade of at least C will thereby absolve his admission deficiency. Otherwise it must be removed as provided on page _____. In Engineering, deficiencies in mathematics and physics may be removed only as specified on page _____.

³ Not more than six units will be accepted in any combination of fine arts subjects.

⁴ Applied music must be accompanied by music theory. Band, orchestra, and chorus are accepted only if they have been offered as curricular subjects, not as activities, and if the prerequisite of Music 1 as outlined by the State Department of Education has been observed; no more than THREE units and no less than one unit will be accepted.

⁵ ONE UNIT IN AGRICULTURE OR HOME ECONOMICS (APPROVED BY THE STATE BOARD FOR VOCATIONAL EDUCATION) MAY BE COUNTED IN EITHER ITEM 3 OR 4 (BUT NOT IN BOTH) UNDER "REQUIRED SUBJECTS AND UNITS." ADDITIONAL WORK IN THESE SUBJECTS MAY COUNT IN ITEM 5.

⁶ Biology may not be counted by a student offering either botany or zoology.

⁷ Arithmetic and general mathematics are not accepted in the Mathematics Group.

⁸ World history may not be counted if either early or modern European history is offered.

(2) Furthermore, any applicant who ranked in the highest quarter of his graduating class in any fully accredited high school and who also ranks in the UPPER HALF of those taking the English and scholastic aptitude tests given by the University to entering freshmen may enter without admission deficiencies except in Engineering.

Applicants of low rank.--As a rule students who do poor work in high school do poor work in the University. A student ranking in the lowest quarter of his graduating class is therefore strongly advised to complete an additional year of preparation before applying for admission. In no case could he be admitted except on scholastic probation; failing to pass the required minimum of work in his first semester, he would be dropped from the rolls. Applicants ranking in the third quarter also will be accepted only on probation. But if any accepted third- or fourth-quarter student is able to rank in the upper half of the group taking either the Psychological Test or the Pre-engineering Inventory Test required of all entering freshmen, his probation status will be cancelled immediately.

Advice as to subjects in high school.--The requirements for admission to the University are designed to provide (a) a fair beginning of a liberal education, (b) a desirable continuity in the student's educational experience, and (c) adequate preparation for studies required in the University. In many cases the minimum units prescribed above may not be enough from those fields. Students expecting to specialize in foreign languages, music, drama, science, or home economics in college should begin those subjects in high school; those looking forward to college work in the sciences, mathematics, medicine, business administration, law, music, or pharmacy should take in high school at least one and a half years of algebra, one year of plane geometry, and, in most cases, two or more years of biology, chemistry, and physics. (See Engineering Requirements on page ____.)

Methods of Obtaining Admission Units

The admission units specified above are usually obtained by graduation from an accredited school or by examination or by a combination of the two. Limited opportunity is also offered by the University's Extension Teaching Bureau for units to be made by correspondence study.

(1) Graduation from an accredited school.--No credit will be accepted toward admission without graduation from an accredited high school. Within the limits of the above list, graduates of schools on the approved list issued by the State Department of Education are credited with the subjects they have completed in which the schools are accredited. In order to determine these units, they are required to present statements of their work made out by the superintendent or principal on the University's official blank, to be had of the Registrar. It is of the highest importance that the applicant send this blank, properly filled out, to the Registrar not later than ten days prior to the opening of the term or semester he wishes to enter. Valuable time will be lost if he does not do so, and more if he has to send for it after he arrives. Without it he cannot be admitted at all.

The University of Texas has no accredited schools outside Texas, but it will usually accept, for work done in a school in another state, credits granted by the state university of that state; or, in the absence of such an institution, by another institution of recognized standing acquainted with the work of the school in question.

(2) Examination.--Any or all scholarship requirements may be met by passing the admission examinations. To obtain credit in any subject, the applicant must make a grade not lower than D. In grading papers in all subjects, account will be taken of the applicant's use of English. Excellence in one subject will not make up for deficiency in another.

At the discretion of the Department concerned, every natural science examination paper must be accompanied by a laboratory notebook.

In April a series of admission examinations is given by the State Department of Education at approved centers. Application to take these examinations should be made to the State Commissioner of Education, Austin 11.

Applicants wishing to take other examinations for admission to the First Semester or the Second Semester should apply to the Registrar of the University at least a month in advance.

Junior-senior high school graduates.--Applicants who have passed through and graduated from a junior-senior high school organization in which the usual type of college entrance subjects were not given in the junior school may be admitted on twelve acceptable units completed in the senior high school (the last three grades), including the unit requirements listed on pages ___ and ___, plus three unspecified units from the junior high school.

Surplus Admission Units

Only in foreign language and mathematics may surplus admission units be converted into degree credit as follows:

A student who has entrance credit in solid geometry in excess of full admission will receive two semester hours toward a degree, provided he makes an average of at least C in six semester hours of trigonometry, analytic geometry, or calculus in residence in The University of Texas. Similarly, a student who has excess entrance credit in trigonometry will receive two semester hours if he makes an average grade of at least C in six semester hours of analytic geometry or calculus in residence in The University of Texas.

A student with credit for more than two admission units in foreign language and a total of more than fifteen units may receive degree credit at the rate of two semester hours for each foreign language unit that is additional both to two units in one foreign language and to a total of fifteen units, by completing in residence in The University of Texas with a grade of at least B the next higher course of six semester hours.

Admission by Individual Approval

At the discretion of the Registrar, an applicant over 21 years old may be admitted without examination to any college of the University except ENGINEERING and Pharmacy. Only residents of Texas are eligible for admission under this plan. Students are strongly advised to complete their high school work and graduate (See (1) Graduation from an accredited school). Graduation from high school will save time in the long run as students who do not graduate receive no credit for any of their high school work and must make up the fifteen units prescribed on page ___. Admission by Individual Approval does not confer special privileges, but, on the contrary puts the applicant under special obligations. Each applicant proceeds as follows:

1. He must make application on the official blank (to be had of the Registrar), giving the information there desired.
2. He must furnish evidence that he has substantially covered the ground of the units required of other candidates, and that he has sufficient ability and seriousness of purpose to do the work desired with profit to himself and to the satisfaction of the University.
3. He must show, by the writing of a composition, that he has an adequate command of English. The title of the composition is "How I plan to make up my entrance deficiencies."

Applicants are advised to send their applications and credentials in advance of their coming to Austin.

Admission by individual approval contemplates applicants who have not recently attended school and therefore could not pass the admission examinations.

Students so admitted may register for courses other than freshman courses only with the approval of the chairman of the department concerned and the Registrar, given because of evidence of special fitness. This approval can rarely be granted, however, because most individual approval students have less preparation than any other students in the University.

Students admitted by individual approval cannot become candidates for degrees until they have satisfied the admission requirements. As to how to remove admission deficiencies, see the following section.

How to Absolve Admission Deficiencies

General provisions.--In addition to the "Special quality provisions" for removing deficiencies (see page _____), admission deficiencies may be made up (1) by taking with the approval of the Registrar, the regular admission examinations in subjects not studied by the student in the University; (2) by correspondence work or extension work (a few courses for this purpose are offered through the Extension Teaching Bureau); (3) by counting work done in the University; (4) BY PROVING UP PREVIOUS WORK, AS EXPLAINED IN THE NEXT PARAGRAPH (RESTRICTED TO ENGLISH, MATHEMATICS AND FOREIGN LANGUAGE). If the second or third plan is used, the prescribed admission units must be earned by work in corresponding subjects in the University; the elective admission units (Groups A-C) may be earned by any University work. For the purpose of removing admission deficiencies, TWO SEMESTER HOURS COUNTS AS ONE-HALF UNIT; THREE SEMESTER HOURS COUNTS AS ONE UNIT. Courses used to absolve admission deficiencies will not count also toward a degree EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN THE NEXT PARAGRAPH.

A STUDENT ADMITTED WITH A DEFICIENCY IN ENGLISH WILL, ON COMPLETING ENGLISH 601 (FRESHMAN ENGLISH) IN THE UNIVERSITY, BE GIVEN CREDIT ALSO FOR THREE ADMISSION UNITS IN ENGLISH. IF ADMITTED WITH A DEFICIENCY IN MATHEMATICS, HE WILL, ON COMPLETING SIX SEMESTER HOURS IN MATHEMATICS IN THE UNIVERSITY, BE GIVEN CREDIT ALSO FOR TWO ADMISSION UNITS IN ALGEBRA; IF THIS MATHEMATICS INCLUDES ALGEBRA AND TRIGONOMETRY, HE WILL ALSO BE GIVEN CREDIT FOR ONE UNIT IN PLANE GEOMETRY. IF ADMITTED WITH A DEFICIENCY IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE, HE WILL, IF HE PASSES AS HIS FIRST COURSE IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE IN THE UNIVERSITY A COURSE HIGHER THAN COURSE 403, BE GIVEN CREDIT ALSO FOR TWO ADMISSION UNITS IN THAT SUBJECT. IN THESE CASES THE STUDENT MAY ALSO USE THE UNIVERSITY COURSES PASSED FOR DEGREE CREDIT.

INDIVIDUAL APPROVAL STUDENTS.--IN GENERAL, STUDENTS ADMITTED BY INDIVIDUAL APPROVAL WITHOUT PREVIOUS COLLEGE WORK, ARE CHARGED WITH ENTRANCE DEFICIENCIES IN ALL REQUIRED SUBJECTS amounting to 15 UNITS (SEE PAGE _____, FOR THE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS). BECAUSE OF THE ILLITERACY OF SUCH PERSONS, A SPECIAL PLAN IS PROVIDED FOR RESOLVING THESE DEFICIENCIES AS FOLLOWS:

ANY SUCH STUDENT MAY MAKE UP ALL OF HIS ENTRANCE DEFICIENCIES EXCEPT IN ENGINEERING BY ATTAINING SOPHOMORE STANDING (30 SEMESTER HOURS) IN THE UNIVERSITY UNDER THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS: (1) ALL OF THE WORK MUST BE DONE IN THE UNIVERSITY; (2) HE MUST HAVE EARNED THE LOWEST AVERAGE ON ALL WORK UNDERTAKEN OF WHICH A GRADE IS RECEIVED AND THROUGH THE SEMESTER OR TERM IN WHICH SOPHOMORE STANDING IS ATTAINED; (3) HE MUST INCLUDE AMONG THE COURSES PASSED (a) ENGLISH 601 (FRESHMAN ENGLISH); (b) AT LEAST ONE SEMESTER OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE OR A YEAR-COURSE IN NATURAL SCIENCE; AND (c) SIX SEMESTER HOURS IN MATHEMATICS, UNLESS HIS SECONDARY SCHOOL RECORD SHOWS TWO UNITS IN ALGEBRA AND/OR PLANE GEOMETRY.

IF THE STUDENT DOES NOT MEET THE REQUIREMENTS IN THE PRECEDING PARAGRAPH IN THE FIRST 30 SEMESTER HOURS PASSED, HE MAY DO SO IN HIS FIRST 60 SEMESTER HOURS AND STILL BE PRIVILEGED TO REMOVE HIS ADMISSION DEFICIENCIES IN A MANNER SIMILAR TO THAT INDICATED IN THE PRECEDING PARAGRAPH. IN SUCH CASE THE GRADE AVERAGE WILL BE BASED ON ALL WORK ATTEMPTED THROUGH THE SEMESTER OR TERM IN WHICH THE FIRST SIXTY SEMESTER HOURS ARE PASSED.

If the student does not meet the conditions in the preceding paragraphs, he must absolve his entrance deficiencies as provided in the section above entitled "General Provisions."

COLLEGE TRANSFERS.--COLLEGE TRANSFERS WHO ARE ADMITTED TO THE UNIVERSITY BY INDIVIDUAL APPROVAL BECAUSE THEY DID NOT GRADUATE FROM HIGH SCHOOL, OR BECAUSE THEY GRADUATED FROM AN UNACCREDITED HIGH SCHOOL, ETC., MUST RESOLVE THEIR ENTRANCE DEFICIENCIES IN A MANNER SIMILAR TO THAT PROVIDED FOR OTHER INDIVIDUAL APPROVAL STUDENTS.

ANY SUCH STUDENT (EXCEPT IN ENGINEERING) WILL ABSOLVE ALL OF HIS ADMISSION DEFICIENCIES IF HE EARNS A C AVERAGE ON THE FIRST THIRTY SEMESTER HOURS PASSED IN THE UNIVERSITY, THE AVERAGE TO BE COMPUTED ON ALL WORK UNDERTAKEN, WHETHER PASSED OR FAILED, THROUGH THE SEMESTER OR TERM IN WHICH THE LAST OF THE THIRTY SEMESTER HOURS ARE PASSED. IN ORDER TO BE GIVEN THIS CONCESSION, THE STUDENT MUST HAVE CREDIT IN THE UNIVERSITY, EITHER FOR WORK DONE PREVIOUSLY OR IN HIS FIRST THIRTY SEMESTER HOURS IN THE UNIVERSITY FOR (1) ENGLISH 601; (2) ONE SEMESTER OF FOREIGN LANGUAGE OR A YEAR-COURSE IN NATURAL SCIENCE, (3) SIX SEMESTER HOURS IN MATHEMATICS UNLESS HIS SECONDARY SCHOOL RECORD SHOWS TWO UNITS IN ALGEBRA AND/OR PLANE GEOMETRY.

If the student does not meet the conditions provided in this section, he must absolve his admission deficiencies as provided in the section above entitled "General Provisions."

Students from Other Colleges

A student seeking admission from another college must present: (1) Evidence of honorable dismissal; (2) an official transcript of his entire college record, including his admission units. All credentials should be sent directly to the Registrar of The University of Texas since the acceptance of credits earned at other institutions is under his jurisdiction. Much trouble and time will be saved by sending this official record not later than ten days prior to the opening of the term or semester which the student wishes to enter. Students are not allowed to register until the proper credentials are presented. Note especially item 15 on page ____.

A student who has failed in his work at another institution and is not entitled to continue there will not be admitted to the University. Others whose records do not meet the standards required by the University may be refused admission or may be admitted on scholastic probation or on any other condition that may seem desirable.

I. Nonresident applicants.--1. Applicants not residents of Texas who have attended another college or university must have a grade-point average of at least 1.0 per semester hour (C AVERAGE) on all work undertaken, whether passed or failed, in the last two semesters of attendance as a regular student or on the total attendance if less than two semesters. This average is computed as follows: A, 3; B, 2; C, 1; D, E, F, 0.

2. Applicants not residents of Texas who do not have a degree and who seek admission to the School of Law must satisfy one of the admission plans shown under "School of Law," beginning on page ____, and must meet the quality requirements set forth in Paragraph 1 above so far as prelaw work is concerned. Applicants holding a bachelor's degree from an approved college may be admitted without reference to these restrictions if they have good records.

II. Residents of Texas.--Legal residents of Texas who have attended another college or university must meet the following standard of work in each of their last two semesters of attendance or on the total attendance if less than two semesters.

3. First- and second-year students for any college except Fine Arts and Pharmacy. A student taking nine or more semester hours must, if a first-year student, pass in at least nine semester hours and make a score of three points; if a second-year student, must pass in at least nine semester hours and make a score of six points. A student taking less than nine semester hours must pass in all work taken and make a score of three points if a first-year student, or as many points as hours undertaken if a second-year student.

4. First- and second-year students for the colleges of Fine Arts and Pharmacy.--Students taking nine or more semester hours must pass in at least nine semester hours and make a score of at least nine points. Students taking less than nine semester hours must pass in all hours taken and make as many points as hours undertaken.

5. Third-year students and above for any college except Business Administration, Fine Arts and Pharmacy.--A third-year student or above taking twelve or more semester hours must pass in at least nine semester hours and make a score of twelve points; or must pass in at least twelve semester hours and make a score of nine points. A third-year student or above taking less than twelve semester hours must pass in all work taken and make as many points as semester hours undertaken.

6. Third-year students and above for Business Administration, Fine Arts or Pharmacy.--Students taking twelve or more semester hours must pass in at least twelve semester hours and make a score of twelve points. Students taking less than twelve semester hours must pass in all work taken and make as many points as semester hours undertaken.

7. Third-year students and above for Law.--Students seeking admission to the Law School under the terms of Provision II (three-year Arts and Sciences program) must satisfy the requirements under 5 above in addition to the requirements of prelaw Provision II; those seeking admission under the terms of Provision IV (three-year Business Administration program) must satisfy the requirements under 6 above in addition to the requirements of prelaw Provision IV.

III. Regulations applying to residents and nonresidents.--Any former student who attends another institution is responsible for getting a transcript of his record to the Registrar before he re-enters.

A former student who has attended another college since leaving the University must meet the quality requirements in Sections I or II on such work, provided his attendance was for as long as one regular semester or quarter. The restrictions will not be applied to work done only in summer sessions at other colleges.

8. Transferred grades are never lowered; they are filed just as they come. For degree purposes, grades earned at other institutions will not be averaged with work done at the University.

9. Inasmuch as undergraduate students taking all their work at the University must have a C average for a degree, only such work completed in another institution as altogether averages the equivalent of the University C will be accepted here.

10. Credit is generally allowed on the above basis for work done in institutions which are fully approved by the regional accrediting agency in the section in which the college is located. Credit may be allowed for good work done in other institutions in accordance with the University's practice in such cases.

11. Applicants who seek admission to the Graduate School must have records of good quality.

12. Credit transferred from a junior college is limited to the total a student carrying the normal load in a particular curriculum may earn in his first two years in the University, usually sixty semester hours, but in no case will the maximum transferred credits exceed sixty-six semester hours. In the acceptance of junior college credit, no course will be considered as above the sophomore level.

13. Any transferred credit granted in applied art will be listed as elective in art. Such credit cannot be specified until the student shall have taken further applied art in the University and received satisfactory grades.

14. Any transferred credit in applied music is listed as tentative and conditional and cannot be counted for credit until validated by one semester's study of applied music in the University.

15. An applicant, whether a new student or a former student of the University, who has attended another collegiate institution is not at liberty to disregard any part of his collegiate record and apply for admission to the University on the basis of his high school record or a partial record of his college work, but is subject without exception to the regulations given above.

16. All credits given students from other colleges are conditional. If in any case the work here is of low grade, the credit allowed may be reduced.

All other provisions with reference to admission to the College of Arts and Sciences (pp.) apply also to admission to the College of Engineering, except that neither the English nor the mathematics nor the physics requirement may be absolved under "Special quality provisions," page

A student admitted with a deficiency must make it up in his first semester. Students deficient in algebra, plane geometry or solid geometry take the work in an extension course on the campus. The fee is \$6.00 per course. Those without physics take Physics 801 in the University. While removing deficiencies, students have to defer some of their regular work. It is therefore better to clear up deficiencies before coming, if possible. Algebra, plane geometry and solid geometry are given by correspondence.

⁹For students seeking the degree of Bachelor of Architecture or Bachelor of Architecture in Regional and City Planning, one unit of chemistry or biology or zoology may be substituted for the unit of physics. If a student does not present physics, chemistry, biology, or zoology, he will be required to take Physics 812a or 812b to remove the entrance deficiency in science.

(1) PREREQUISITES, MASTER OF EDUCATION DEGREE; (2) REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO THE GRADUATE SCHOOL; AND (3) DEGREE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE M. S. IN HOME ECONOMICS

The Dean of the Graduate School has filed with the Secretary of the Faculty Council three recommendations approved by the Graduate Faculty January 10, 1950, as published below. They relate to the prerequisites for the Master of Education degree, requirements for admission to the Graduate School, and degree requirements for the M. S. in Home Economics. The Secretary has classified these recommendations as minor legislation.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE GRADUATE FACULTY

- I. Amend the Graduate School Catalogue No. 4908, page 42, by deleting paragraph 1 under Prerequisites and substituting the following:
"The completion of a bachelor's degree from The University of Texas or a standard bachelor's degree from another accredited institution is prerequisite to the degree of Master of Education."
Paragraph 2 was retained in its present form:
"2. Another prerequisite is at least twenty-four semester hours in Education, not less than twelve of which must be advanced."

REASON: Many years ago special concessions were made to graduates of teachers colleges which were not made to graduates of other colleges. Under the present conditions it seems best to have a uniform set of admission requirements.

- II. Substitute for the first paragraph in the Graduate School Catalogue No. 4908, page 27, under Admission to the Graduate School these paragraphs:
"Effective in June, 1950, in addition to other requirements set forth below, for unconditional admission to the Graduate School an applicant must have an average of at least B in twenty-four semester hours of advanced course work submitted as prerequisite to admission to the Graduate School.
"The qualitative condition shall be removed if the student in his first twelve semester hours of work creditable toward his graduate degree earns a grade of B or better in each course taken. Failing to do this, the student shall complete with grades of B or better twelve semester hours of work creditable toward a graduate degree in a single semester or in not more than two summer terms of registration. Failing to meet this second requirement, the student shall be ineligible to continue the graduate program he has been pursuing."

REASON: The first paragraph is merely a verbal modification of the rule now in force in the Graduate School Catalogue which says that the student must have an average of at least B in eighteen to twenty-four semester hours of advanced work offered as prerequisite to the proposed graduate major, and it seems best to have a uniform rule for all entering graduate students.

The second paragraph explains how conditions may be removed.

- III. Amend the Graduate School Catalogue No. 4908, page 137, under degree requirements for the Master of Science in Home Economics (bottom of the page) by adding paragraph 6:
"Group 6. Child Development. Students choosing this group must take H.E. 698, 372K, and nine additional semester hours in the major chosen with the advice of the major professor."

REASON: For many years the Department of Home Economics has given some work in Child Development, especially in connection with its nursery school program. The department now had the staff and courses for a major within the general program of the Master of Science in Home Economics.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION TRAINING CONTRACT: Contract V4049V-302 covering Part VII and Part VIII trainees in the Main University for the Long Session of 1949-50 and the Summer Session of 1950 has been executed which provides for adjusted tuition at the rate of \$10.02 per semester hour.

The following supplements to this contract have also been executed making certain modifications to the main contract:
