RENTAL OF SPACE FOR BOOKSTORE, MEDICAL BRANCH: On the basis of appropriate requisition from the Medical Branch, the State Board of Control has made an award of lease for space as listed below. I recommend approval and ratification of the award as made by the Board of Control, and that Mr. Charles H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, be authorized to sign the lease agreement:

Rental agreement between The University of Texas and E. Bovio covering approximately 1200 square feet of floor space located at 923 Avenue C, Galveston, Texas, to be used as a bookstore for the Medical Branch for the one-year period beginning March 1, 1957, at a monthly rental rate of \$100.00.

WILLIAM HEUERMANN FUND FOR CANCER RESEARCH - PARTIAL DISTRIBUTION:

The Endowment Office has received a check in the amount of \$9,000 from Guaranty Title and Trust Company of Corpus Christi, Executor of the Heuermann Estate, as the eighth partial distribution from that part of the estate bequeathed to The University of Texas for the use and benefit of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research. This distribution makes a total of \$234,000 that has been received under the terms of Mr. Heuermann's will. Of the \$9,000 presently received, \$7,228.06 will be placed in the endowment account and \$1,771.94 in the current interest income account.

CHECK FROM EX-STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION: The Ex-Students' Association has sent a check for \$2,000 "representing accumulated unrestricted gifts from University of Texas alumni." These funds are being deposited in a special account for Central Administration with the purpose at present to be undesignated.


INCREASE IN WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE FUND RATE: Because of increase in the amount paid for compensation benefits for injury in the last two fiscal years and the anticipated increase in this account in the future, I recommend that effective September 1, 1957, the rate be changed to 3/4 of 1% rather than 1/2 of 1% which was effective September 1, 1955. The law provides that the University may have in this fund an amount not exceeding 2% of the annual payroll of covered employees. This change was recommended by Mr. J. C. Kennedy, Director of Workmen's Compensation, and approved by Mr. C. H. Sparenberg, Comptroller, and Mr. J. C. Dolley, Vice-President for Fiscal Affairs.

OUT-OF-STATE TRIPS: I recommend ratification of your approval by "no-protest" of Mail Docket No. 3, attached as part of this docket. P. 764,





RECOMMENDATION OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

The Faculty Council recommends to the General Faculty the adoption of the recommendation to the Board of Regents that Part II, Chapter I, Section 3, Subsection d, of the RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS the passage beginning "The trial committee, by a majority of the total membership . . ." be amended to read:

The committee, by a majority of the total membership, will make written findings on the material facts and a recommendation of the continuance or termination of the accused faculty member's tenure. The committee, by a majority of its total membership, may make any supplementary suggestions it deems proper concerning the disposal of the case. The original of such findings and the basic recommendation, together with any supplementary suggestions, shall be delivered to the Board and a copy thereof to the accused. If minority findings, recommendation, or suggestions are made, they shall be similarly treated. The Board of Regents, by a majority of the total membership, will approve, reject, or amend such findings, recommendation, and suggestions if any, or will recommit the report to the same committee for hearing additional evidence and reconsidering its findings, recommendation, and suggestions if any. Reasons for approval, rejection, or amendment of such findings, recommendation and suggestions if any, or for recommitment of the report, will be stated in writing and communicated to the accused.

REASONS: The purpose of this proposal is to correct the vagueness of the present statement of the responsibilities of trial committees operating under the tenure rule (RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS, Part II, Chapter I, Section 3, Subsection d) by specifically charging such trial committees with responsibility for doing three things: (1) making findings with regard to matters of fact, (2) recommending the continuance or the termination of the accused faculty member's tenure, and (3) making whatever other suggestions they deem appropriate concerning the disposal of the case. The reason for the stipulation of these three responsibilities is the possibility that a case might arise with regard to which such a trial committee might find that the facts justified some change in existing arrangements but not the termination of the affected faculty member's tenure. It is clearly understood and explicitly stated that the Board of Regents have the power and right to set aside any possible supplementary suggestions, and also to reject and reverse any recommendation, subject only to their commitment to giving their reasons for such decisions.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

1. The Faculty Council recommends that steps be taken to obtain for the faculty upon a group basis both disability income replacement insurance and major medical expense insurance. Of the two insurance programs, the committee feels that disability income replacement insurance is the more pressing and important unmet insurance need. Therefore, if a choice needs to be made between these two programs, the Faculty Council recommends that the effort be made first to obtain disability income replacement.
2. The Faculty Council recommends that the President appoint a committee of the faculty to develop the specific insurance plan. A representative group must speak for the faculty in developing the specific insurance policy. The Faculty Welfare Committee is too small and not representative enough to perform this task and the Faculty Council is too large a body for the task. In appointing the committee, the President should seek to obtain a group representative of the faculty in terms of age, rank, marital and dependents status, and of the schools and colleges on the campus. The committee will submit its recommended plan to the Faculty Council for final approval. The Faculty Welfare Committee offers to cooperate fully with the committee appointed by the President.
3. The Faculty Council recommends that the long run aim be to establish a true group insurance program and that an association group program be undertaken only as a temporary measure until necessary legislation may be secured to permit University participation in the payment of premiums.
4. The Faculty Council does not make specific recommendations concerning the details of the policies that should be obtained. This should be done by the committee appointed by the President. However, the Faculty Council approves the suggestions of the Committee on Faculty Welfare that:
 - (a) A long waiting period for the disability income replacement insurance should be used. The longer the waiting period the lower the premium for the coverage. Faculty members are able to absorb the risk of short illness. It is for the lengthy, major illness that the faculty member needs insurance so as to replace income lost through that illness. It is noteworthy that the TIAA program prescribes a six-month waiting period.
 - (b) A sizeable deductible or corridor amount should be prescribed for the major medical expense insurance. Again, this will reduce the premium by limiting the coverage of the insurance to the really major medical expenses.
 - (c) The insurance contract should provide that the rates are subject to annual or biennial revision. The University faculty represents a very favorable risk group. By subjecting the rates to periodic revision based upon our group's experience we can obtain full benefit from the favorable risk characteristics of the group.
 - (d) In selecting the insurance carrier, it should be remembered that one of the principal items purchased under the contract is service. Therefore, care should be exercised in selecting an insurance carrier equipped to provide adequate service here in Austin.
 - (e) While the Faculty Welfare Committee has tried to educate the faculty concerning the various insurance programs, more must be done to inform the faculty fully about these insurance programs. The Faculty Welfare Committee is willing to cooperate in this.

The College of Arts and Sciences has filed with the Secretary of the Faculty Council the recommendations published below relating (1) to limiting the application of ROTC courses toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences to four-year ROTC students; (2) to amending the list of required courses in Eastern European concentration under a major in Eastern European studies for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (3) to amending the requirement for a major in Economics for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (4) to amending the requirement for a major in English for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (5) to amending the requirement for the major and minor in Geography for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (6) to amending the requirement for a major in Spanish for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (7) to amending the major and minor requirements for a major in Speech for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I; (8) to specifying that the first year of Law be used toward the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan III, Scheme I; (9) to amending two requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Geology; and (10) to amending the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II, groups 4, 5, and 6. The recommendations were approved by the College of Arts and Sciences by the circularization procedure on January 21, 1957. The Secretary has classified these recommendations of exclusive application and primary interest only to a single school or college.

Notice is hereby given that this legislation will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless a signed protest, with reasons, is received by the Secretary of the Faculty Council from a member of the Council within five days of the date of this publication. If a protest is received, the proposed legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council for action at its meeting of February 18, 1957.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCESROTC Courses

On page 26 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "APPLICATION OF ROTC COURSES TOWARD DEGREES IN THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES," change the first paragraph

- From: "ROTC courses may be counted toward certain degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences, in the manner and amounts listed below:"
- To: "ROTC courses may be counted toward certain degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences, in the manner and amounts listed below provided the student completes twenty-four semester hours of required air, military, or naval science courses:"
- Reason: It is believed that it was originally intended to allow only four-year ROTC men to apply ROTC courses toward degrees in the College of Arts and Sciences as they otherwise would have been required to add 24 hours of ROTC to their original degree program, making a staggering total in some cases. If a man is separated from his ROTC unit prior to completion of four years of ROTC, the need for the substitution is not so great.

Eastern European Studies

On pages 33-34 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors" under "Eastern European Studies" under "Required Courses in Eastern European Concentration"

DELETE "Government 324M."

Reason: Government 324M is not being offered this long session and was offered in the 1956 Summer Session as a two-semester-hour course. Inasmuch as the program permitted a choice between Government 324M and 376, the deletion of 324M does not alter the amount of government required.

Department of Economics

On page 34 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors" under "Economics"

CHANGE the Major requirement

From: "Twenty-four semester hours of economics, including Economics 303 or 356K and at least twelve advanced hours. Economics 302 and 303 may be counted toward the major."

To: "Twenty-four semester hours of economics, including at least twelve advanced hours. Economics 302 and 303 may be counted toward the major."

Reason: Economics 356K has been changed to senior rank.

Department of English

On page 34 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under the "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, under "C. Majors and Minors" under "English"

CHANGE the Major requirement

From: "Thirty semester hours of English, including English 601 or 601Q and at least eighteen advanced hours, of which six are of senior rank."

To: "Thirty semester hours of English, including (a) English 601a (or 601Qa) and 601b (or 601Qb) unless the student has been officially exempt from one or more of these courses; (b) six hours of sophomore courses including not more than three hours in writing (English 310, 310Q, 317, 317Q, 319, 319Q) or linguistics (318M); (c) three advanced hours in the plays of Shakespeare (English 321, 361K, 366K); (d) three hours in American literature (English 337, 338, 340, 377K, 379, 379K); and (e) twelve additional advanced hours.

"Of the thirty hours required for the major, at least six must be of the senior rank and not more than a total of nine may be selected from the following writing courses above the freshman level: English 310, 310Q, 317, 317Q, 319, 319Q, 325, 333K, 341, 367K, 367L.

"Each course in English taken at the University and counted as satisfying the major requirement must be passed with at least a grade of C."

Reason: To provide (1) a well-balanced course and (2) one which will furnish an adequate background for the teaching of English, by requiring English majors to present work in specified basic areas. This will in no way affect the work of other departments.

On page 31 of the same Catalogue under the "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "B. Special Requirements" under "1"

ADD "In addition, majors in English are required to pass with a grade of at least C each course in English taken at the University and counted as satisfying the major requirement."

Department of Geography

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On page 35 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors" under "Geography"

CHANGE the Major requirement

From: "(a) For Cultural Geography, thirty semester hours of geography including Geography 303, 304, 374, and at least fifteen additional advanced semester hours; or (b) for Professional Geography, Geography 303, 304, 312, 313 or 301 or 302, and twenty-four semester hours of advanced courses in geography, including Geography 374 and either 371 or 873 or equivalent field experience.

"A student majoring in professional geography must take Geology 601, Physics 801, and six semester hours of mathematics selected from courses in trigonometry (unless offered for admission), algebra (unless two years of high-school algebra are offered for admission), analytic geometry, and elementary statistics. In his senior year the student must take the Graduate Record Examination and pass a proficiency examination in one foreign language, preferably French or German."

To: "Twenty-four semester hours of geography, including Geography 301K, 303 or 304, 312, and fifteen advanced hours including Geography 374."

Reason: To conform more closely with the requirements of the Social Science departments on the campus.

ADD "Classical languages" to the list of subjects under "First Minor."

Reason: To broaden the supplementary materials or fields in connection with the Minor.

Department of Romance Languages

On page 39 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences under the "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I" under "C. Majors and Minors" under "Spanish"

CHANGE the Major requirement

From: "Spanish 406, 407, 612, 218 (or the equivalent), and at least twelve semester hours of advanced courses in Spanish. A student who fails to pass Spanish 407 with a grade of A or B is required to present at least sixteen semester hours of advanced courses in Spanish. Only such portion of the freshman and sophomore courses need be taken as may be required by the score on the placement test."

To: "Spanish 406, 407, 612, 218 (or the equivalent), and at least twelve semester hours of advanced courses in Spanish, of which at least six must be in Spanish literature. A student who fails to pass Spanish 407 with a grade of A or B is required to present at least sixteen semester hours of advanced courses in Spanish. Only such portion of the freshman and sophomore courses need be taken as may be required by the score on the placement test."

Reason: The statement, "of which at least 6 must be in Spanish literature," appeared in Catalogues from 1945 to 1951 but was inadvertently omitted beginning in 1952-53, and the Department of Romance Languages now wishes to reinstate it as part of the Spanish major requirement.

Department of Speech

On page 39 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "Requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "C. Majors and Minors" under "Speech"

CHANGE the Major requirement

From: "Thirty semester hours of speech, including Speech 305, 306, 050, six semester hours of sophomore courses, and fifteen semester hours of advanced courses, of which six hours are of senior rank."

To: "Thirty semester hours of speech, including Speech 305, 306, three semester hours of sophomore courses, and fifteen hours of advanced courses, of which six hours, including Speech 365, are of senior rank."

Reason and Explanation: The Department of Speech recommends the substitution of Speech 365 for 050 in order to give the speech major a greater over-all view of the several areas in the field of Speech. It is also the opinion of the Department of Speech that general speech proficiency can be determined in a more effective manner under the seminar conditions of Speech 365. Under the proposed plan the student will have twenty-one semester hours of elective courses in speech.

CHANGE the Minor requirement

From: "(a) Drama 314; (b) six semester hours of advanced courses in English; and (c) six semester hours of advanced courses in any one of these subjects or combination of them: anthropology, classical civilization, economics, education, English, geography, government, history, journalism, linguistics, psychology, sociology."

To: "Eighteen semester hours, including six hours of advanced courses, in any one of the following subjects or a combination of two of them: anthropology, classical civilization, drama, economics, education, English, geography, government, history, journalism, linguistics, philosophy, psychology, sociology."

Reason and Explanation: The proposed change will permit greater freedom for the student in the selection of courses related to his interest in speech. It will permit greater freedom for the student, particularly if he plans to teach. Under the proposed plan the student will be able to select one or more possible areas. The proposed change will bring the minor for the Speech major in line with other departmental minors.

The B.A. Degree in Combination with Law

On pages 43-44 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under "Degree Preparatory to Law, Plan III, Scheme I"

CHANGE requirement "7"

From: "(a) Credit for twenty-eight semester hours of work completed in the School of Law at The University of Texas; and (b) a weighted average of at least 65 on all law work completed at The University of Texas in which a final examination was taken."

To: "(a) Credit for the first year's work (twenty-eight semester hours) completed in the School of Law at The University of Texas; and (b) a weighted average of at least 65 on all law work completed at The University of Texas in which a final examination was taken."

Reason: Inasmuch as Law grades are not available in time for students to graduate at the close of the first year in the School of Law, such students either apply for graduation the following August or January or sometimes defer graduation until even later. In calculating the average for graduation with honors, it has been the policy of the Dean's Office to permit such students to apply on the Bachelor of Arts Degree the 28 hours of Law on which the highest grades have been made. This practice has been questioned, and the above proposal is designed to bring the B.A. degree in combination with Law into conformity with the B.A. degree in combination with medicine, the latter of which clearly states that the first year of medical school will be used for the bachelor's degree.

On page 44 of the same Catalogue under "Degree Preparatory to Law, Plan III, Scheme II"

CHANGE "(2)"

From: "secures credit for twenty-eight semester hours of work in the School of Law at The University of Texas;"

To: "secures credit for the first year (twenty-eight semester hours) in the School of Law at The University of Texas;"

Reason: To conform to the proposed change under Plan III, Scheme I.

Department of Geology

On page 50 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under the "Degree of Bachelor of Science in Geology" under "A. Prescribed Work"

CHANGE requirement 5

From: "Biology 607 or six semester hours in anthropology."

To: "Biology 607."

Reason: A knowledge of elementary biology is an essential part of paleontology, which is a required field of study in the professional degree.

CHANGE requirement 9

From: "Government 610; Economics 302, 303, or 315; and six semester hours in United States history (History 615)."

To: "Government 610, six semester hours in United States history, and three semester hours selected from economics, philosophy, advanced anthropology, or advanced geography."

Reason: To allow a choice of subject material in three of the fifteen hours of required social sciences.

Department of Home Economics

On page 54 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1955-1957 under the "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II," under "C. Order and Choice of Work," under "4. Home Demonstration Group"

CHANGE the name of the Group to read, "Home and Commercial Demonstration."

Reason: This Group serves a double purpose which should be reflected in the title.

DELETE "three semester hours of speech," and ADD "Three semester hours elective," and "a speech proficiency test."

Reason: To provide room for three semester hours of elective chosen from the area of basic courses: accounting, logic, mathematics, statistics, foreign language, drawing, music theory (needed to meet the general education requirements for undergraduate degrees).

DELETE "Curriculum and Instruction 667H," and "three semester hours elective in advanced secondary education," and ADD "nine semester hours of elective."

Reason: The students who complete this major accept positions in the Home Economics Extension Service or in business, none of which requires a teaching certificate. The present program permits only three semester hours of elective, which is too rigid.

DELETE "Sociology 302 and ADD "Sociology 322."

Reason: Sociology 322 is an advanced course which overlaps 302 in course content, and it seems more desirable to have an advanced course prescribed rather than one at the freshman level.

DELETE the explanatory paragraph at the close of the group as it would no longer apply.

On page 54 of the same Catalogue under the same degree under "5. Teacher Education Group"

ADD "Educational Psychology 320K and Curriculum and Instruction 320L.6" and "a speech proficiency test," and

DELETE "Sociology 302" and "three semester hours of speech."

Reason: To provide room for the addition of six semester hours of education to comply with the new certification requirements in Texas.

CHANGE "three semester hours elective in advanced secondary education" to read, "Three semester hours elective in education."

Reason: The addition of Ed.P. 320K, Adolescent Growth and Development, and Ed.C. 320L.6, Fundamentals of Secondary Education: Institutional Aspects, more than takes care of the secondary education requirement and the advanced hour requirement for this group.

CHANGE the present "six hours of elective in home economics" and "three hours elective" to read, "nine hours elective chosen with the approval of the departmental adviser."

Reason: To satisfy the new certification requirements.

On page 55 of the same Catalogue under the same degree under "6. Interior Decoration Group"

DELETE "Architecture 410K" and "Drawing 209" and

ADD "Architecture 607."

Reason and Explanation: These changes are necessitated by changes in course offering planned by the School of Architecture. Architecture 607, Introduction to Architectural Design, will incorporate the basic design principles formerly included in Architecture 410K.

The recommendations were approved by the College of Engineering at its regular meeting on February 7, 1957. The Secretary has classified these recommendations of exclusive application and primary interest only to a single school or college.

Notice is hereby given that this legislation will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless a signed protest, with reasons, is received by the Secretary of the Faculty Council from a member of the Council within five days of the date of this publication. If a protest is received, the proposed legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council for action at its meeting of March 18, 1957.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

In Plan 4 leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering beginning on page 28 of the Engineering Catalogue for 1956-58, which is University Publication 5611, dated June 1, 1956, change the following:

Reduce Ch. E. 345, Fuel, Combustion, and Heat Balance to Ch. E. 245

Reason: Removes the Thermodynamics material and puts it in Ch. E. 361. No relation between fuels and combustion and thermodynamics as considered in this course.

Reduce Chem. 812 to Chem. 512K

Reason: Chem. 812 is no longer given by the Chemistry Department. Quantitative Analysis is now Chem. 512K.

Remove Chem. 368, Principles of Colloid Chemistry

Reason: Greater flexibility - to provide more choice in technical electives.

Remove M. E. 320Q and 340Q, Heat Power Engineering, and Heat Power Engineering and Laboratory

Reason: Part of the material is to be covered in Ch. E. 361. Other parts are paralleled more or less in other Chemical Engineering courses.

Add Ch. E. 361, Thermodynamics I

Reason: To include the thermodynamics as noted above. Also includes Process rates.

Add Ch. E. 179, Senior Problems

Reason: Special seminar in connection unit operations laboratory.

Add Ch. E. 351, Advanced Calculations, or M. 326, Differential Equations

Reason: To give student background in unsteady state principles

Increase technical electives from six to nine hours

Reason: To give student more latitude, and a greater choice of technical electives.

Add General Electives 3 hours (may be either technical or non-technical)

Reason: To give student more choice of electives

In Plan 8 leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering beginning on page 35 of the same bulletin, change the following:

Change E. E. 635 and E. E. 436, which are service courses given by the Electrical Engineering Department for students taking Mechanical Engineering, totaling 10 semester hours, to three more courses:

E. E. 335K, Fundamentals of Electricity and Electric Circuits, 3 hours of lecture

E. E. 335M, Magnetic Devices and Electrical Machinery, 2 hours lecture and 1 lab period

E. E. 435L, Industrial Electronics and Controls, 3 hours lecture and 1 lab period.

Reason: It is believed that this change will present to the students of Mechanical Engineering a more modern conception and utilization of Electrical Engineering fundamentals.

DEGREE PROGRAMS.--The following degree designations have been approved for Texas Western College by the Texas Commission on Higher Education at the meeting on November 5, 1956, to be effective as of that date.

1. Bachelor of Science in Metallurgical Engineering in lieu of the existing degree of Bachelor of Science in Mining Engineering with a Metallurgy option.
2. Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering and Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering in lieu of the existing degrees of Bachelor of Science in Engineering with options in Civil Engineering and Electrical Engineering.
3. Bachelor of Science in Education and Master of Education in lieu of the existing degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts with majors in Education.

These actions involve changes in degree designations only and do not affect the curricula offered at the present time.

The Commission has also approved the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the Bachelor of Science in Nursing Education.

GIFTS.--The following gifts have been received by Texas Western College. I recommend acceptance and that the thanks and appreciation of the Board be sent the donors:

CONTRACT.--Ratification of a memorandum agreement between the Public Service Board of El Paso and Texas Western College for research work in the amount of \$2,515 for the period November 1, 1956 to July 1, 1957 is recommended. The title of the research project is "The Investigation of Sanitary Aspects of Sewage Sludge and Compost." The work will be directed by Mr. James B. 




