

Proposed Allocation from PUF Bond Proceeds for Library Special Collection

Based upon a request dated December 15, 1989 from President Natalicio, an allocation of \$50,000 from the PUF library special collection reserve is recommended.

The University of Texas at El Paso has an opportunity to purchase a large collection of works by renowned photographer Manuel Carrillo. Senor Carrillo died in January, 1989, leaving behind this personal collection valued at between \$200,000 and \$300,000 based on the cost of individual print sales. Before his death Senor Carrillo expressed a desire that his collection be housed at a university in the United States. Senor Carrillo's widow has accepted U. T. El Paso's offer of \$50,000 for the collection and all rights to it.

Art collector Arnold Gilbert has committed to donate his collection of Manuel Carrillo works to the U. T. El Paso Library upon the University's acquisition of the collection from Mrs. Carrillo. Mr. Gilbert's generosity will enhance the collection by two or three portfolios of work, each valued at more than \$2,000, and more than 200 prints, each valued at \$200 or more. Grant and local funds will be used to pack, ship, catalog and preserve the collection.

In June 1986, \$1 million was appropriated by the U. T. System Board of Regents for special collections. This amount was placed in reserve for institutional requests when unusual acquisition opportunities exist. The reserve now stands at \$591,635.
