I recommend approval of the following budget items:

Office of the President

1. Extend the appointment of Mr. Roy J. Cates, Executive Assistant, Office of the 75th Anniversary, through August, 1958, at a monthly stipend of \$539, funds to come from Committee of 75 for Committee Expenses.
2. Approve the appointment of Mrs. Peggy Lou Brady, Statistical Clerk on a trainee basis, effective February 1, 1958, at an twelve months salary of \$2,640, funds to come from unused salaries and Central Administration Unappropriated Balance, and effective May 1, 1958, remove the trainee status and increase the salary rate to \$2,760 for twelve months, additional funds to come from Central Administration Unappropriated Balance.

Meeting of February 28, 1958: *M-1233, 1958*

"Associate of the Graduate Faculty: An Associate of the Graduate Faculty is appointed by the Dean of the Graduate School on nomination by the appropriate Committee on Graduate Studies for listing of that person as eligible to supervise Master's theses. All such appointments shall terminate on August 31 in even-numbered years. Under exceptional circumstances and by request of the appropriate Committee on Graduate Studies, and approval of the Dean of the Graduate School, an Associate may be permitted to supervise specific doctoral dissertations, in general not exceeding a total of three during the entire period of his status as an Associate of the Graduate Faculty.

"Authorization to teach graduate courses other than thesis and dissertation courses are made by the appropriate Committee on Graduate Studies and are subject to the approval of the Graduate Dean. Such authorization shall not constitute appointment as an Associate of the Graduate Faculty."

Meeting of March 31, 1958:

1. Recommendations concerning new graduate courses, changes in graduate courses, and designation of teachers of graduate courses shall be made by the Committee on Graduate Studies of the appropriate teaching department. These recommendations shall be reviewed by the undergraduate dean concerned, or the appropriate administrative officer of the budgetary unit of the University, relative to their budgetary and personnel implications, and then sent to the Graduate Dean for action by the Graduate Council.
2. The Graduate Council of The University of Texas shall be composed of six members of the Graduate Faculty and, in addition, with vote, the Secretary of the Graduate Legislative Council and the Associate Dean of the Graduate School. The Dean of the Graduate School shall serve as Chairman with a casting vote in the event of a tie. The tenure of membership of the Secretary of the Graduate Legislative Council and the Associate Dean of the Graduate School shall be for the same period during which they hold these offices. The remaining six members of the Council shall be selected by the Dean of the Graduate School. An interval of at least two years must elapse before any Council member can be reappointed. One Council member shall be replaced each year, beginning September 1, 1958. In constituting the Council, the Dean shall give attention to securing the broadest possible representation of all areas of graduate instruction. The Graduate Dean shall appoint members of the Graduate Council as the Chairmen of such committees as the Council may determine to be essential to the proper discharge of its functions. Additional personnel of these committees shall be appointed by the Graduate Dean, in consultation with the Chairmen of the Committees, from the members of the Graduate Faculty.

This apparatus will be of value both to the Department of Chemistry and the Department of Chemical Engineering, but because of its complexity, best results can be obtain if it is disassembled by a factory expert, moved under his supervision, reassembled, and put in working condition. It is estimated that such cost will be \$5,000. I recommend that this amount be appropriated from Main University Unappropriated Balance for this purpose.

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE MARQUIS G. EATON ACCOUNTING EDUCATION FUND: Mr. Marquis G. Eaton, President of the American Institute of Certified Public Accounts, died in San Antonio on February 23, 1958. The three Vice-Presidents who served under him, Mr. William S. Deeming, Chicago, Mr. R. Warner Ring, Miami, and Mr. L. H. Penney, San Francisco, wish to establish as a memorial to him the Marquis G. Eaton Accounting Education Fund to which his friends may make contributions.

I recommend the adoption of the following resolution by the Board setting up this fund:

The Marquis G. Eaton Accounting Education Fund

There is hereby established the Marquis G. Eaton Accounting Education Fund of the College of Business Administration Foundation of The University of Texas. Monies deposited in this fund shall be held separate as an endowment, the income of which shall be devoted solely to the furtherance of accounting education, accounting research, and the progress of accounting, including student scholarships or fellowships.

A Marquis G. Eaton Accounting Education Fund Advisory Committee shall be appointed annually by the President of the University to make recommendations to the Budget Council of the Department of Accounting concerning expenditures from the income of the endowment in implementation of the stated purposes of the fund. All vouchers for expenditures, except for expenses of trust, shall be originated by the Budget Council of the Department of Accounting and submitted to the Dean of the College of Business Administration.

In the event that the total principal does not amount to \$10,000 by the end of 1963, the Advisory Committee established in the preceding paragraph may recommend to the Board of Regents that both the income and principal be expended in carrying out the purposes of the fund; otherwise expenditures shall be solely from income on the principal.

Under the gift section of this docket is reported a number of contributions to this fund.

APPROPRIATION FOR PRELIMINARY EXPENSES OF ART BUILDING AND MUSEUM: At the Regents' meeting in June, 1957, approval was given to an appropriation from the Archer M. Huntington Museum Fund for Consulting Architect's Fees on the proposed Art Building and Museum at the Main University in order that work might be started on the preliminary plans, the balance to be made later when funds were available. In order for the Consulting Architect to proceed with these preliminary plans, it is necessary to have certain surveys, test holes, etc. I concur in Mr. Sparenberg's recommendation that \$1,500 additional be appropriated from the Archer M. Huntington Museum Fund to an allotment account for Art Building and Museum to take care of preliminary expenses.

APPROPRIATION FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CURBS, GUTTERS, DRIVES AND EXTENSION OF UTILITIES - HAL C. WEAVER HEATING AND POWER PLANT: In the request for bids on the addition to the Hal C. Weaver Heating and Power Plant, two additive alternates were included which involved the construction of curbs, gutters, and drive, and the extension beyond the building of a number of utilities, but which were not provided for in the original \$1,500,000 appropriation for the power plant expansion. The total needed for these additions is \$16,490, and I recommend that this amount be transferred from Account No. 27200 - Improvements, Remodeling, and Major Repairs Allotment Account to Account No. 91120 - Expansion of Power Plant, an Available University Fund appropriation carried in the Central Administration series of accounts. (1477)

KINSOLVING DORMITORY ACCOUNTS: There remains in Account No. 94190 - Kinsolving Dormitory - Movable Furniture and Equipment - the sum of \$51,830 out of the \$215,000 appropriated to it from Account No. 4350, Division of Housing and Food Service - Major Repairs, Remodeling and Replacement, and Operating Reserve Fund. On recommendation of Mr. Sparenberg and Mr. Landrum, I recommend that \$33,830 be returned to Account No. 4350, and that a like sum be transferred from Account No. 4350 to set up a new account, No. 51760, Kinsolving Dormitory - Pre-operating Account, to be set up in the Auxiliary Enterprises section of Main University accounts, for the purchase of silverware, china, glassware, etc. The Movable Furniture and Equipment account was set up in Central Administration accounts.

I also recommend that approval be given to the request of Messrs. Sparenberg and Landrum to establish the operating account for Kinsolving Dormitory, and to operate with an over-draft balance in this account throughout the remainder of the 1957-58 fiscal year.

APPROPRIATION FOR MOVING AND RELOCATING S HALL: It is necessary to relocate S Hall during the construction of the new central chilled water plant. I recommend that an appropriation of \$5,000 be made from Account No. 27200, Improvements, Remodeling, and Major Repairs Allotment Account to an account entitled "Moving and Relocation of S Hall."

REMOVAL OF R.O.T.C. ARMORY FROM CAMPUS: In response to advertising for bids to remove the ROTC Armory from the campus, only one was received. That was submitted by Mr. H. E. Stanley, who offered to remove the building for the sum of \$250, provided all the materials belonged to him. The Business Manager was authorized to sign the contract with Mr. Stanley for this purpose. I recommend ratification.

USE OF TEXTBOOKS WRITTEN BY FACULTY MEMBERS: I recommend that approval be given to the use of School Health Program as a textbook in Physical and Health Education. The book was written by Dr. Jessie Helen Haag, Associate Professor in that department, is published by Henry Holt and Company, and sells for \$6.50, with a 13.5% royalty to author.

SALE OF EQUIPMENT TO STAFF MEMBER: Two motor vehicles belonging to the Division of Extension, Little Campus Motor Pool, were advertised for bids, and the results indicated that it was to the advantage of the University to sell the cars outright rather than trade in on new ones. The high bids received were: 1953 Chevrolet 1/2-ton Carryall, \$489; 1955 International 1/2-ton Travelall, \$535.

The eight bids on the International Travelall ranged from \$279.50 to \$535, and the high bidder was Clyde Bennett Supermarket of Waco. Mr. Bennett, a member of this firm, is also an employee of the University.

I recommend that approval be given to sell the two vehicles at the prices indicated, specific approval being given for the purchase by Mr. Bennett, a staff member.

CONVAIR EXCELLENCE IN ENGINEERING TEACHING AWARDS: Convair of Fort Worth has presented an award for Excellence in Engineering Teaching for the last three years. The faculty member to receive the award is chosen by a committee in the College of Engineering, and the award (\$1,200) is presented directly to the recipient. Those who have won the award are: James W. Turnbow, Engineering Mechanics, 1956, Carl Morgan, Civil Engineering, 1957, and W. E. Duesterhoeft, Electrical Engineering, 1958.

Frantz to spend two months in Mexico during the summer of 1958, during which time he will deliver six lectures at the National University of Mexico and will visit, in the interest of the II International Congress of Historians of Mexico and the United States to be held next fall at the University, all of the higher institutions of learning in Mexico.
4. The balance to hold for further awards or emergencies.

I recommend approval.

SALE OF SURPLUS MATERIAL - DEPARTMENT OF MECHANICAL ENGINEERING: The Department of Mechanical Engineering submitted a list of surplus material which was advertised for bids after other University departments had been given an opportunity to acquire whatever they wished. Seven pieces were sold as a result of the bids opened April 15, at a total of \$375.86, and the remaining equipment readvertised. Bids on twenty-three items of the latter were opened May 13, 1958, totaling \$3,491.09. The College of Arts and Sciences has filed with the Secretary of the Faculty Council the recommendations published below (1) to add the degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics to the list of degrees toward which ROTC courses may be applied; (2) to clarify the language requirement for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Plans I, III, and IV, Bachelor of Journalism, and Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I; (3) to amend the language requirements for the Degrees of Bachelor of Science in Geology and Bachelor of Science in Physics; (4) to amend the journalism requirement for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism, Plan II; (5) to amend the mathematics requirement for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Geology; and (6) to amend some requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I, and Plan II, Groups, 1, 2, 4, 5, and 7. The recommendations were approved by the College of Arts and Sciences by the circularization procedure March 31, 1958. The Secretary has classified these recommendations of exclusive application and primary interest only to a single school or college.

Notice is hereby given that this legislation will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless a signed protest, with reasons, is received by the Secretary of the Faculty Council from a member of the Council within five days of the date of this publication. If a protest is received, the proposed legislation will be presented to the Faculty Council for action at its meeting of April 21, 1958.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Recommendation of the Department of Home Economics

On page 29 of the Catalogue of the College of Arts and Sciences for 1957-1959 under "APPLICATION OF ROTC COURSES TOWARD DEGREES IN THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES," after "8. Bachelor of Science in Geology,"

ADD "Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I, and Plan II, Groups 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, and 7

- (1) Substitute for Government 610b..... 3 hours
(2) Free electives.....3 to 9 hours
Total.....6 to 12 hours"

Reason: Since men are electing the degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, it is desirable that Home Economics follow the policy prevailing for other degrees.

Clarification of the Foreign Language Requirement for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Plans I, III, and IV, Bachelor of Journalism, and Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I

- 1. On page 32 of the same Catalogue, under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE requirement 3

From: "Foreign language: The foreign language requirement is the attainment of a certain proficiency rather than the completion of a specified number of hours. Completion of courses 406 and 407 in a foreign language and six semester hours of work beyond that level in the language, generally course 612, or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test meets the requirement. A student offering Latin must take at least twelve

hours of Latin, regardless of the score made on the placement test. A student who chooses a major in the Latin American Institute must take Spanish or Portuguese (see the bulletin of the Institute of Latin American Studies). For the special foreign language requirement for the Eastern European Studies program, see 'Eastern European Studies' under 'C. Majors and Minors.'

"If a Romance language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the Department of Romance Languages before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations."

2. On page 46 of the same Catalogue, under "Plan III, Degree Preparatory to Law: Bachelor of Arts," CHANGE requirement 3 (as amended by the Faculty Council September 13, 1957) to read,

"Courses 406 and 407 in a foreign language and three semester hours of a sophomore course in the same foreign language (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test). Students offering Latin as the foreign language must take at least six semester hours of Latin beyond 406. A student who has received credit for prior work in Latin, either in high school or college, should consult the Chairman of the Department of Classical Languages, who will designate the Latin course for which the student should enroll.

"If a Romance or Germanic or Slavonic language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student is given transfer credit for two six-hour courses in a language approved for this degree, taken at another college before he first transfers to the University, he may be considered to have satisfied the language requirement for this degree. 3. On page 47 of the same Catalogue, under "Plan IV, Scheme I, Degree Preparatory to Medicine: Bachelor of Arts," CHANGE the last footnote to read,

"If a Romance or Germanic or Slavonic language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student is given transfer credit for two six-hour courses in a language approved for this degree, taken at another college before he first transfers to the University, he may be considered to have satisfied the language requirement for this degree. A student who is given transfer credit for less than 12 semester hours in an approved language may request a placement test to determine whether he is entitled to enter a higher language course than that permitted by the University's evaluation of his transfer credit."

4. On page 48 of the same Catalogue, under "Plan IV, Scheme II, Degree Preparatory to Medicine: Bachelor of Arts," CHANGE the first footnote to read,

"If a Romance or Germanic or Slavonic language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student is given transfer credit for two six-hour courses in a language approved for this degree, taken at another college before he first transfers to the University, he may be considered to have satisfied the language requirement for this degree. A student who is given transfer credit for less than 12 semester hours in an approved language may request a placement test to determine whether he is entitled to enter a higher language course than that permitted by the University's evaluation of his transfer credit."

5. On page 49 of the same Catalogue, under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE requirement 2 to read,

"Courses 406 and 407 in a foreign language and three semester hours of a sophomore course in the same foreign language (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test). Students offering Latin as the foreign language must take at least six semester hours of Latin beyond 406. A student who has received credit for prior work in Latin, either in high school or college, should consult the Chairman of the Department of Classical Languages, who will designate the Latin course for which the student should enroll.

"If a Romance or Germanic or Slavonic language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student who has taken language at another college believes he is entitled to a standing more advanced than that shown by the University's evaluation of transfer credits, he may request a placement test to determine whether he may go beyond the level at which he has been placed; or, if he believes he has achieved the proficiency required for the degree, he may request an advanced standing examination in the last course required for the degree by applying first to the Chairman of the appropriate language department."

6. On page 54 of the same Catalogue, under "Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE requirement 3 to read,

"Courses 406 and 407 in a foreign language (preferably a modern language) and six semester hours of sophomore courses in the same language (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test).

"If a Romance or Germanic or Slavonic language is used in meeting this requirement, any student with a knowledge of the language, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student who has taken language at another college believes he is entitled to a standing more advanced than that shown by the University's evaluation of transfer credits, he may request a placement test to determine whether he may go beyond the level at which he has been placed; or, if he believes he has achieved the proficiency required for the degree, he may request an advanced standing examination in the last course required for the degree by applying first to the Chairman of the appropriate language department."

Reason: Germanic and Slavonic Languages have requested the same regulation as the Romance Language Department; and the rewording clarifies this point. Likewise, the rewording is intended to clarify the treatment of transfer credit in languages where such credit is in terms of three-hour units in the freshman and sophomore years. At present the regulations make no provision for the student who takes the final course required in a language without having credit for the prerequisite course; the new statement provides for this possibility.

Recommendations of the Departments of Geology and Physics with Reference to the Language Requirements

1. On page 53 of the same Catalogue, under "Bachelor of Science in Geology," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE requirement 3 to read,

"French 406, 407, and 314K, or German 406, 407, and 314K or 315K; or courses 406, 407, and three semester hours of a sophomore course in Czech or Portuguese or Russian or Spanish (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test).

"Any student with a knowledge of one of these languages, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who, by departmental permission, enrolls without the prerequisite for the most advanced course required may absolve his language requirement by passing this course.

"If a student is given transfer credit for two six-hour courses in a language approved for this degree, taken at another college before he first transfers to the University, he may be considered to have satisfied the language requirement for this degree. A student who is given transfer credit for less than 12 semester hours in an approved language may request a placement test to determine whether he is entitled to enter a higher language course than that permitted by the University's evaluation of his transfer credit."

2. On page 59 of the same Catalogue, under "Bachelor of Science in Physics," under "A. Prescribed Work," CHANGE requirement 7 to read,

"(a) French 406, 407, and 314K, or German 406, 407, and 315K (or such portion thereof as may be required by the score on the placement test), or the equivalent in another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics, at least six hours of which must be in reading physics or allied subjects; or (b) a reading knowledge (defined below under special requirement B 2) of either French or German or another foreign language approved by the Department of Physics.

"Any student with a knowledge of one of these languages, however acquired, may absolve the requirement by passing, with a grade of at least B, the final examination in the highest course called for by the requirement. Application for such a final examination must be made to the Chairman of the appropriate language department before a regularly scheduled period of final examinations. A student who is given transfer credit for less than 12 semester hours in an approved language may request a placement test to determine whether he is entitled to enter a higher language course than that permitted by the University's evaluation of his transfer credit."

#### Recommendation of the School of Journalism

On page 50 of the same Catalogue under "Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Journalism," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE item 10, Plan II, (4) by adding "Journalism 377K," as follows:

"Eleven semester hours selected from the following: Advertising 345J, 347J, 360M, and 371M; Journalism 325, 333, 336, 377K, 278, 379; Journalism 201 if taken in the freshman year."

Reason: Journalism 377K, a new senior course in public relations, seems to us to be a very important course in a program of studies for an advertising major.

#### Recommendation of the Department of Geology

M-11.5

On page 53 of the same Catalogue under "Bachelor of Science in Geology," under "A. Prescribed Work,"

CHANGE requirement 2

From: "Six semester hours of mathematics, including analytic geometry."

To: "Six semester hours of mathematics, including three semester hours of calculus."

Reason: To permit the student to fulfill the prerequisites of Geophysics, advanced Geology, and Petroleum Engineering courses needed for his training.

CHANGE requirement 7 from "four courses" to "three courses" and OMIT "Mathematics 613a or 613Ba." Requirement 7 would then read as follows:

"Three courses selected from the following: Astronomy 620a; Botany 319, advanced botany; Chemistry 810a, 810b, 512K, 314, 416, advanced chemistry; Civil Engineering 354; Engineering Mechanics 315, 220; Mathematics 613b or 613Eb, 316, advanced mathematics; Meteorology 820a, other advanced meteorology; Petroleum Engineering 620a, other advanced petroleum engineering; Philosophy 363; Physics 812b, 325, 335, 339; Zoology 310, 414, advanced zoology."

Reason: Increasing the mathematics requirement to include three hours of calculus automatically satisfies one course in the four courses previously required under item 7.

1. On page 54 of the same Catalogue under "Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I," under "C. Order and Choice of Work," make the following changes:

- a. In the Freshman Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 302" to read, "Home Economics 305."
- b. In the Sophomore Year
  - (1) CHANGE "Home Economics 316" to read, "Home Economics 316Q."
  - (2) CHANGE "Home Economics 305" to read, "Home Economics 310K."
- c. In the Junior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 333" to read, "three semester hours of advanced elective in home economics."

Reason: Plan I is a non-professional degree, and H.E. 316Q is suitable and does not require H.E. 302 as prerequisite. Home Economics 333 is being reduced to sophomore level and will be numbered 310K.

2. On pages 55-58 of the same Catalogue under "Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II" make the following changes:

- a. Under "1. Nutrition Group,"
  - (1) In the Junior Year, CHANGE "Three semester hours elective in home economics" to read, "Home Economics 324"; CHANGE "Home Economics 333" to read, "Home Economics 310K"; and CHANGE "Educational Psychology 311" to read, "Educational Psychology 318."
  - (2) In the Senior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 367" to read, "three semester hours elective in home economics."

Reason: Home Economics 367 will no longer be offered, and it is therefore recommended that H.E. 324 be required for this group. The College of Education is no longer offering Ed. P. 311.

- b. Under "2. Institutional Administration and Restaurant Management Group,"
  - (1) In the Freshman Year, CHANGE "Management 302" to read, "three hours of elective," and CHANGE "Home Economics 306" to read, "Home Economics 307."
  - (2) In the Junior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 345" to read, "Home Economics 332."
  - (3) In the Senior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 361K" to read, "Home Economics 361."

Reason: Home Economics 306, 345, and 361K will no longer be offered. A general elective will be more usable in this major than Management 302.

- c. Under "4. Home and Commercial Demonstration Group,"
  - (1) In the Freshman Year, CHANGE "Educational Psychology 301 and Educational Administration 305 (unless Educational Psychology 311 and Educational Administration 312 are to be taken in the sophomore year)" to read, "Curriculum and Instruction 308."
  - (2) In the Sophomore Year, CHANGE "Educational Psychology 311 and Educational Administration 312 (unless Educational Psychology 301 and Educational Administration 305 were taken in the freshman year)" to read, "Educational Psychology 318."
  - (3) In the Senior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 333" to read, "Home Economics 310K."

Reason: The change in education courses is necessitated by change in course offering in the College of Education, and Home Economics 333 is being changed to a sophomore course, 310K.

d. Under "5. Teacher Education Group,"

- (1) In the Freshman Year, CHANGE "Educational Psychology 301 and Educational Administration 305 (unless Educational Psychology 311 and Educational Administration 312 are to be taken in the sophomore year)" to read, "Curriculum and Instruction 308."
- (2) In the Sophomore Year, CHANGE "Educational Psychology 311 and Educational Administration 312 (unless Educational Psychology 301 and Educational Administration 305 were taken in the freshman year)" to read, "Educational Psychology 318."
- (3) In the Junior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 333" to read, "Home Economics 310K."

Reason: Same as for "c." above.

e. Under "7. Child Development Group,"

- (1) In the Freshman Year, CHANGE "Educational Psychology 301" to read, "Curriculum and Instruction 308."
- (2) In the Sophomore Year, CHANGE "three semester hours elective" to read, "Home Economics 310K"; and CHANGE "Educational Psychology 314 or 314Q" to read, "Educational Psychology 318."
- (3) In the Junior Year, CHANGE "Home Economics 333" to read, "three semester hours elective," and CHANGE "Home Economics 349" to read, "three semester hours elective in home economics."
- (4) In the Senior Year, CHANGE "six semester hours elective in home economics" to read, "Home Economics 372K and three semester hours of advanced elective in home economics."

Reason: Home Economics 349 will no longer be offered, and the content of H.E. 372K is essential in order to give a well rounded program in child development. The changes in education courses are necessitated by changes in the course offering in the College of Education.





GIFTS.--The following gifts have been made to Texas Western College. I recommend acceptance and that the thanks and appreciation of the Board of Regents be sent to the donors by the Secretary except in the case of gifts of \$100 or less which I have been authorized to accept on behalf of the Board. In the case of scholarships where the recipient is designated by the donor, it has been ascertained that the donor is a charitable or public foundation and the donation does not constitute an evasion of taxes.

1. The Centennial Museum has received copies of several manuscripts pertaining to archeological sites in south central New Mexico and some adjacent areas of Texas which were compiled by the late Mr. Herbert W. Yoe, of Las Cruces, New Mexico. This acquisition is valued at about \$435 and was made possible through Dr. Stanley Stubbs of the Laboratory of Anthropology, Santa Fe, New Mexico. *Yoe's*
