APPROPRIATIONS FROM CAMPUS SERVICES, INC.

The Chancellor has approved expenditure of the following sums from retained profits of Campus Services, Inc., for the purposes noted:

- \$119.00 for expense of sending head cheerleader, Main University, to Phoenix, Arizona, to participate in the baseball games May 17 and 18, 1962.
- \$50.00 to cover the cost of two tables at the annual Honors Awards banquet of the Austin Citizens' Safety Council. The University's participation in this annual affair is an important factor in our good relations with the City of Austin.
- \$1,000.00 to support publication cost of the annual volume of student writing, "Corral." This is a project of the Main University English Department, supported in part by income from the Nothwang bequest. It is recommended that this \$1,000.00 be provided by releasing the \$1,000.00 commitment for the Committee of Governing Boards which will not be needed prior to September 1. The unexpended and uncommitted balance of the reserved earnings of 1960-61 is approximately \$400.00. Retained earnings for the current year are estimated at approximately \$12,000.00, a budget for which will be submitted through the Executive Committee.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT

The Chancellor recommends that Frank D. Graydon, Budget Officer, be permitted to serve as Technical Consultant with the "National Committee on Governmental Accounting" of the Municipal Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This employment is in conjunction with editing the Manual on Governmental Accounting and Auditing which is now in the process of being rewritten. 11-195

The consulting work will involve approximately the equivalent of ten to twelve days' time to be performed nights, week ends, and during vacation time. It will not interfere with University assignments, and will conform with the Regents' Rules and Regulations on outside employment. It is to be effective for the balance of the current fiscal year.

UNIVERSITY PERSONNEL OFFICE RECOMMENDATIONS

The University Personnel Office recommends the following vacation-holiday schedule for classified personnel of Central Administration and Main University. The allotted time corresponds to the provisions of the State Appropriation Bill and has been approved by President Smiley and the Chancellor. C-16

The Bill provides a maximum of ten working days of vacation for "annual employees of the State." State institutions of higher education are privileged to rearrange holiday and vacation schedules within the total number of days provided. Two additional State Legal Holidays not observed by the University are added to the statutory allowance to provide a total of twelve working days annual leave for 1962-63. The Appropriations Bill also provides that "annual employees with fifteen or more years of continuous employment with the State shall be entitled to two normal work weeks plus three additional normal working

days of vacation in any one fiscal year." Therefore, University employees with fifteen years continuous State employment are entitled to fifteen working days annual leave for 1962-63. Persons who have been continuously employed for six months or longer in salaried positions and on at least a half-time basis are eligible to take annual leave to the extent of one day for each month of continuous employment in the current fiscal year.

SUPPLEMENT TO DEED OF DECEMBER 19, 1949, TRANSFERRING MAGNESIUM PLANT TO UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS: In the Minutes of the January 21, 1950 meeting of the Board of Regents, page 312, is a resolution confirming the action of President Theophilus Painter in negotiating with and accepting from the United States Government a deed dated December 19, 1949, and other instruments transferring to the University the property known as the Magnesium Plant -- now called Balcones Research Center. In the Main University docket of January 7, 1950, attached to the minutes the deed is described as being dated December 19, 1949, from The Reconstruction Finance Corporation to the University of Texas, recorded in book number 994, pages 337 to 344 of the Deed Records of Travis County, Texas. M-700

The supplement now presented for approval is signed by J. H. Bond, Regional Director, Region VII, Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Dallas, and provides that the United States of America, acting through the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, amends "that one certain paragraph pertaining to reports" so that annual instead of semi-annual reports will be reported to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare during the twenty-year period covered in the deed.

Following approval by the Board of Regents, the supplement will be recorded in the County Deed Records of Travis County.

NATIONAL DEFENSE STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM: Main University has submitted to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D. C., an application to participate in the National Defense Student Loan Program for the period July 1, 1962 - June 30, 1963. The amount requested is \$249,975.00 as the Federal Capital Contribution to bring the total funds available for lending from July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963 to \$292,250.00 for an estimated 550 borrowers. On the basis of this request, the University must make a Capital Contribution of \$27,775. M-385a.2

FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation M-164 passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty:

1. The Faculty Council on April 12, 1962, approved by the circularization procedure the proposed catalogue changes in the requirements for the Bachelor of Science in Education, the Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education, and the Bachelor of Science in Physical Education Degrees (D&P 3020-3028).

These proposals are the result of many months of study by the faculty of the College of Education and represent a sweeping re-constitution and condensation of courses and significant changes in degree patterns and are submitted as complete substitutes for the present programs rather than as amendments to specific items. They provide that the number of undergraduate courses listed in the 1962-63 catalogue be reduced from 98 in the previous catalogue to 49, and that the former ten separate plans for the Bachelor of Science in Education be dropped. Attention has been given to total curricula for undergraduate preparation of teachers, and the resulting degree patterns and regulations reflect a desire to give The University of Texas a program of teacher education of the highest quality.

Each program requires a minimum of 60 semester hours in general education, with adequate assurance that study will occur in the major fields of knowledge, and calls for significant academic specialization. Prospective secondary school teachers will have at least 24 hours in each of two subjects or 48 hours or more in a composite field; and elementary school candidates, a minimum of 36 semester hours in academic specialization with 18 to 24 hours in a single subject. The academic courses are prescribed so as to give content coverage to the subject-matter demands upon teachers. Professional courses begin at the junior level and require a minimum of 18 semester hours (formerly 24). Selective admission to the pursuit of teacher education is also introduced.

2. The Faculty Council at its meeting of April 16, 1962, approved the motion to delete the statement on Surplus Admission Units which appears in the catalogue (D&P 3015). Beginning in 1932-33 the University discontinued its requirement of two admission units in a foreign language and changed the requirement in mathematics from two units in algebra and one in plane geometry to two units in mathematics. A student presenting surplus admission credits in these two fields could convert them into degree credit provided he met certain scholastic conditions. Effective September 1963, two units in a foreign language will be required for admission to the College of Arts and Sciences and this fact, coupled with the advanced placement examination program, makes the language provision obsolete. In view of the fact that both solid geometry and trigonometry, when taken in high school are properly high school subjects, no college credit will be given for them except by advanced placement examination.

3. The Faculty Council on May 15, 1962, approved by the circularization procedure the proposed changes in Plan 9, Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Petroleum Engineering (D&P 3042). These changes do not change the total curriculum hours from 136 but simply substitute certain courses, dropping others and adding some.

4. The Faculty Council at its meeting of May 21, 1962, approved the resolution that a report on predicted enrollment and on entrance requirements and procedures be made by the Director of Admissions and the Chairman of the Faculty's Standing Committee on Admissions at the November meeting of the Faculty Council (D&P 3043).

5. The Faculty Council on May 29, 1962, approved by the circularization procedure the proposed changes in the College of Arts and Sciences catalogue as follows (D&P 3045-52):

Arts and Sciences (continued)

- (1) Remove the possibility of substitution of ROTC courses for Journalism courses for the degree of Bachelor of Journalism. Reason: The number of hours of journalism required for the B. J. degree has been reduced, and the number of elective hours has been increased. Also, the provision for substitution of ROTC for Journalism has seldom been exercised in recent years.
- (2) Specify groupings of courses in Fine Arts which may be used as a first minor for the majors under the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I, which allow Fine Arts as a first minor. Reason: This is the result of a study requested by the Dean of the College of Fine Arts that an inter-college "program in art, drama, and music" be set up, subject to existing degree requirements and consistent with the major-minor programs now in operation for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I."
- (3) Change the requirements for a major in Anthropology and amend the requirements for the first minor for a major in Anthropology for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. Reason: To insure broader selection of courses in the total field of Anthropology.
- (4) Amend the requirements for a major in Chemistry for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I by allowing students who make a satisfactory grade on the advanced placement examination in general chemistry to receive credit for Chemistry 801a and then enroll in Chemistry 402, a fuller content course than Chemistry 801b.
- (5) Change the requirements for the first and second minors for the French major for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. This changes the requirements for first minor from six to nine semester hours of at least sophomore rank in a second foreign language and includes Fine Arts along with other subjects. Reason: An additional three hours in the second language would greatly increase the student's command of that language, and courses in art, drama, and music often have great relevance to certain programs of study in foreign language and literature.
- (6) Change the requirements for the major in Linguistics and for the minors for the Linguistics major for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. The modifications will make an undergraduate program comparable in requirements to those of other leading universities and set a pattern for undergraduate programs in Linguistics being instituted variously in the country.
- (7) Amend the requirements for the first minor for a major in Philosophy for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. This includes courses in Fine Arts which the Department of Philosophy feels are an important area of human experience of value to Philosophy majors.
- (8) Change the introductory heading and the major requirement for a major in Psychology for the degree of Bachelor of Arts Plan I. This requires Psychology majors to take six semester hours of mathematics including Mathematics 305, 305E, or the equivalent, prior to taking Psychology 317. Psychology majors need the preparation afforded them in the mathematics courses before taking Psychology 317.
- (9) Change the requirements for the first and second minors for the Spanish major for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan I. This requires an additional three hours in the second language which will greatly increase the student's command of that language. It also provides that courses in art, drama, and music may be counted in the second minor.
- (10) Amend two requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Journalism. One is a change in language to avoid ambiguity in meaning. The other amendment rearranges courses to strengthen the journalism requirements at the senior level.
- (11) Amend one requirement for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemistry. This provides that Inorganic Chemistry is required in the major.

FACULTY LEGISLATION (continued)
Arts and Sciences (continued)

(12) Make changes under the degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II, under the following groups: Nutrition; Institution Administration and Restaurant Management; Costume Design, Textiles, and Clothing; Home and Commercial Demonstration; Teacher Education; Interior Decoration; and Child Development.

Changes are made in courses in Education to meet requirements of certificate to teach. Other minor changes represent a rearrangement of courses. The most important of these changes is in Interior Decoration where a student is given a choice between certain courses in Art and in Architecture. This has been necessitated because of deletion by Architecture of certain formerly prescribed courses in that School.

OUTSIDE DUTIES: I recommend that the following staff be permitted to undertake the outside duties outlined below, the work to be performed so as not to interfere with University assignments, and otherwise to conform to regulations of the Regents.

1. Mr. Geza Knipfer, Technical Staff Assistant, Department of Botany, to act as consultant in professional landscape work from time to time.
2. Mr. W. P. Lehmann, Professor of Germanic Languages, to serve as consultant to Information for Industry, Inc., Washington D. C., the work to be intermittent and probably not to total more than two or three days a year.
3. Mr. Francis B. May, Professor of Business Statistics, to act as consultant to Combat Development Group, United States Army Medical Service on operations research, the time to be about "three man months" during the fiscal year.
4. Mr. James Clifton Williams, Associate Professor of Music, to act as Guest Conductor-Composer at three recitals away from the campus.
4. Mr. Robert L. Dorsett, Offset Press Operator, Bureau of Business Research, to do work on an irregular schedule in a local print shop on evenings and week-ends.
6. Mr. Daniel P. Rosas, Offset Press Operator, Bureau of Business Research, to do extra work on an irregular schedule in a local print shop.

TRAVEL WITH EXPENSES PAID FROM NON-TRAVEL FUNDS: The following travel has been approved with expenses paid from funds not including the word "travel."

1. Dr. Joseph R. Smiley, President, April 24, 1962, to Dallas, Texas, to represent the University at a special luncheon meeting of Dallas Advertising League dedicated to higher education in Texas, and to confer with heads of other institutions of higher education in Texas, expenses to be paid from Development Expenses - Main University.
2. Mr. Arno Nowotny, Dean of Student Life, March 31-April 3, 1962, to Philadelphia, to attend the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, the amount of \$6.25 to be paid from Maintenance and Operation since the travel account was short that amount.

Delgado, Assistant Professor of Pharmacy, April 23-28, 1962, to Indianapolis, Indiana, Chicago, Illinois, and St. Louis, Missouri, to accompany seniors on annual required inspection trip, expenses to be paid from the Maintenance, Operation and Equipment account of the College of Pharmacy.
4. Mr. R. C. Norris, Assistant Director, Radio-TV, May 27-June 4, 1962, to Mexico City, to do research in connection with graduate course to be offered on Problems of Foreign Broadcasting Systems which will emphasize Mexico in fall semester of 1962, expenses paid from Conferences and/or Lectures in the Latin-American Field, Institute of Latin-American Studies.

E. D. FARMER SCHOLARSHIP FUND: At the July 1961 meeting of the Board of Regents revisions to the Rules and Regulations governing the E. D. Farmer International Scholarship Fund submitted on pages 56 and 57 of Main University docket were approved. There was inadvertently omitted a proposed addition under Sec. III, 3 -- Conditions of Appointment. Accordingly it is recommended that the following sentence be added to the aforementioned paragraph: M-5097d.

Holders of Farmer Fellowships shall be granted tuition scholarships.

The paragraph then will read:

3. CONDITIONS OF APPOINTMENT. Scholarship appointment shall ordinarily be for one school session of nine months, but may be for a shorter period or for as long as twelve months. Applications for reappointment shall be considered along with those for first appointment. During their incumbency holders of Farmer Scholarships may not engage in any employment for pay. They may be dismissed for cause or otherwise disciplined, or rewarded, just as are other students. Stipends shall be paid in installments, for the convenience of the holder. Every appointee shall report his expenditures, study program, and general activities as specified by the Faculty Committee. Holders of Farmer Fellowships shall be granted tuition scholarships.

USE OF TEXTBOOKS WRITTEN BY FACULTY MEMBERS: I recommend approval of the use of the following textbook written by a faculty member, this approval being requested for the 1962 Summer Session and the 1962-63 Long Session: M-174

2. The Press and the Law in Texas, by Norris G. Davis, Associate Professor of Journalism, published by The University of Texas Press, which sells at \$4.50 with 10% of retail price to author.
3. Contemporary Public Relations, by Alan Scott, Associate Professor of Journalism, co-author, published by Prentice-Hall, which sells for \$7.50 with 5% of retail price to Mr. Scott.
4. Journalism and the School Paper, by DeWitt C. Reddick, Professor of Journalism, published by D. C. Heath, which sells for \$4.15 with 10% of wholesale price to author.

Discounts were on the total monthly bills.

A study of the individual unit prices has been made and where differences in unit prices exist the consumption of the products last year has been determined and computations made to determine if the consumption figures at the unit prices quoted would change the overall bid awards. This study revealed that awards should be made to the companies submitting the greater discount on the monthly bill. The base unit prices are approximately the same as the base unit prices for the current fiscal year. For the 1961-62 year Polar Ice Cream Co. has given a 16.5% discount on milk, and Carnation Company an 18.0% discount on ice cream. Both firms have provided satisfactory service and have given a quality product.

It should be pointed out that only two laundries have the capacity to do all of the University laundry work - Austin Laundry and Driskill Laundry. In order to try to get competition, it was arranged to have bids taken on individual groups or on a total basis. This is the first time in several years that one laundry has bid on all the work. For the current year contracts were awarded to four firms at prices ranging from .057 cents to .062 cents per pound for finished flatwork. Thus the low bid of .0545 cents per pound will result in quite a savings for next year.

4. CONTRACT FOR LAUNDRY AND DRY CLEANING IN KINVOLSING DORMITORY: Since 1958-59 fiscal year Austin Laundry and Dry Cleaning Co., Inc., and Burtons' Laundry and Cleaners have provided laundry and dry cleaning services to the occupants of Kinsolving Dormitory. The contract for these services was based on the best bid received that year and has been renewed each year since then. The University receives \$25.00 per month from the cleaners. M-527

It is recommended that this contract be renewed for the fiscal year 1962-63 subject to the same conditions and requirements as in previous year.

Vacation Schedule

Two additional State legal holidays not observed by the College are added to the maximum vacation of 10 working days provided by the State Appropriation Bill, making a total of 12 working days. Persons who have been continuously employed for six months or longer in classified positions and on at least a half-time basis are eligible to take annual leave to the extent of one day for each month of continuous employment in the current year. Invitations to bid were sent to three paving contractors; three bids were received with Hugh McMillan submitting the low bid of \$2,449.65. The funds for this contract will come from Auxiliary Enterprises Funds - Parking Services.
2. Contract with Green Thumb Garden Center, 6259 Airport Road, El Paso, Texas, to landscape part of the center triangle area of the campus. Invitations to bid were

sent to four nurseries. Three bids were submitted with Green Thumb Garden Center submitting the low bid of \$1,968.00. The funds for this contract will come from the appropriation for Physical Plant, Grounds Maintenance, Maintenance and Operation.

I recommend that Texas Western College be authorized to execute the following contracts and agreements:

1. Contract with Associated Food Services, Inc., P. O. Box 4752, Greenville Avenue Station, Dallas, Texas, to operate the Main Dining Hall and the Miners Hall Dining Room for the fiscal year beginning on September 1, 1962. This company has had the contract for the last two years and the service has been excellent. The contract will be on the basis of cost plus a fixed fee of \$500.00 per month for the Main Dining Hall and \$150.00 per month for Miners Hall Dining Room. 7-207
2. Contract with Boys Concessions of El Paso for the concession sales rights for athletic and other events at the New Sun Bowl, Kidd Field and Memorial Gymnasium for a period of three years beginning September 1, 1962. This concessionaire has had the concessions contract for the past year and has done an excellent job. Texas Western will receive 25% of the gross sales from the concession. 7-208
3. Agreement with the City of El Paso and El Paso Electric Company for the installation of street lights in the area of Memorial Gymnasium with all materials and labor for the installation furnished by the City and El Paso Electric Company and with the College making a construction contribution of \$500.00. The funds will come from available physical plant funds. Four of the light standards will be on College land on streets that are not dedicated. The electricity for the lights will be furnished by the City of El Paso. 7-209
4. Agreement with the City of El Paso to resurface Randolph Street from Kerbey Avenue to Robinson Avenue with the City to furnish all equipment and labor and Texas Western College to buy the materials. Randolph Street on the campus is not a dedicated street. It is estimated the materials will cost from \$2,200.00 to \$2,500.00, with the funds to come from the appropriation for major improvements and repairs. 7-210

PURCHASE OF AIR-CONDITIONING EQUIPMENT

You have approved the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment for Room 212 of the Engineering Building. This room is used as the office of two faculty members; it has no ceiling fan and during warm weather is very uncomfortable. The cost of the equipment will be approximately \$200.00 and will be charged to the Engineering Department's Maintenance and Operation account. 




